—ALBERTON BOARD OF TRADE — The Council of the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade held a meeting the evening of the 15th inst. In addition to the members from O'Leary and Tignish there were present of the Alberton members, Messrs. J. W. Wauch, W. R. Oulton, H. Clark, C. Macbeth, T. C. Bell, Sney, J. E. Birch and S. R. Burke. The matter of the circular and letter accompanying it issued by the Summerside Board of Trade relating to the present and suggested time-table for the West was discussed at some length. It was stated that many of the claims in the petition were unfounded and that some advantageous features were altogether omitted. The petition stresses the many advantages to the western capital but avoids the matter of the convenience as well as the wishes of the great majority of the people residing in the western section of the province. The hope was expressed that the public ever to be trusted when such matters are submitted to it, would not be hasty in signing the petition but that reading it carefully, would perceive that the present time-table is much superior to the suggested one and their sounder judgment would warn them not to sign the petition. A committee, consisting of Messrs. Birch, Wauch and Burke, was appointed to draw up a resolution to be forwarded to the railway authorities, thanking them for the installation of the gasoline coach and the present schedule which is most satisfactory. Meeting adjourned.
