The Guardian regrets to learn of the serious illness of Albert Gaudet, wire commissioner, Summerside. Mr. Gaudet was taken suddenly ill on Wednesday evening, last of heart trouble with which he has been troubled for some years. At latest accounts last evening he was resting easily.

The marriage took place by the Rev. Hammond Johnson, at the Methodist parsonage, Summerside, last evening of Miss Katie Clarke, daughter of W. F. and Mrs. Clarke, Summerside, to Leopold Compton, son of the late George Compton of St. Eleanors. Congratulations.

The annual meeting of the Summerside Presbyterian congregation was held in the schoolroom on Wednesday evening last. Rev. H. G. Straube presiding. The report of the various committees were submitted as follows:—The Session, by the Pastor Rev. G. R. Straube; the Sunday School, by Rev. F. M. Hicks; the Ladies Aid, by Mrs. D. M. Waugh; the W. F. M. S., by Miss Z. Muirhead; the Missionary Society, by W. S. Bearisto and the Love League, by Albert Simpson. The report of the session showed a gain in membership of thirty, with removals nineteen and deaths two, leaving a net gain in membership of nine. The total receipts for missions, amounted to six hundred and thirty one dollars and twenty one cents. The Ladies Aid reported a successful year, having a net balance of one hundred and forty one dollars. The managers report showed the receipts by subscription and loss collection to be one thousand and eighty four cents, an increase of one hundred and eighty seven dollars and twelve cents over previous year. The board of managers were re-elected. It was decided that beginning with 1909, a full financial statement in pamphlet form, giving the names of contributors with the amount of the contribution as well as all the items of expenditure, be published and distributed among the congregation.

A profitable and interesting meeting was held at Augustine Cove on the 9th inst when the farmers of Lots 27-28 Institute met to discuss their "Painful and Successes." Representative farmers were present from Albany, North Tryon, Lower Tryon and Augustine Cove. President Cameron at 3 p. m. took the chair and stated the subject for discussion. He gave his own experience telling of his wheat crop failure, and inviting the opinion of those present as to the cause. He was followed by B. W. Howatt, Joe Noonan, Jas. Arnett, D. J. Thompson and W. C. Lea. The conclusion being that the soil was worked before it was quite dry enough in the spring. J. E. Murphy gave in detail the method of cultivation which resulted in growing his prize field of wheat, also the result of a test of Danish Island and Banner oats, the Banner yielding by far the best. Meeting adjourned. Evening session opened at 7.30 with the pres. in the chair. Joseph Noonan moved the adoption of the following resolution:—Whereas an effort is being made by some parties to induce our farmers to buy Hand Cream Separator, and send cream instead of the milk to the creameries, offering as an inducement that they will make more money by their use. Therefore resolved—that in the opinion of this meeting of the Farmer's Institute of Lots 27-28 that it is not in the best interests of our farmers to invest in them, as instead of lessening our work it will increase it. That it will also increase the cost of producing milk, something we all wish to avoid. And further resolved—that the use of them will lower the high standard of Creamery Butter, by the mixing together of cream of different qualities, and not being of a uniform ripeness; thus lowering the standard of our butter and eventually ruining the butter trade of this Island. The above was seconded by B. W. Howatt and supported by D. J. Thompson, J. A. Dawson, Jas. Arnett, Gordon McFarlane, Job Inman, Harry Webster, P. C. Leard, N. F. McFadyen, Artemus Cameron and carried unanimously by the meeting. An interesting discussion on late fall plowing and the best varieties of oats for our farmers to grow brought the meeting to a close. The next meeting will be held in Middleton Hall on Thursday 21st inst at 2 and 7 p. m. Subject for discussion. Would it be in the interests of the farmers of this Province to have an Act passed by the Legislature, requiring all exports as far as possible to be labeled with the name of the producer? J. E.
