Black Hawks Snatch 6-5 Win From Detroit Team

CHICAGO, Nov. 26 (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks, without a victory since their second game of the national league hockey season, scored in the last two minutes of play tonight to break a 5-5 deadlock and defeat Detroit Red Wings 6-5.

CHICAGO, Nov. 26 (AP) — Detroit has claimed 18-year-old Jack Knesaw Mountain Landis, husband's "indispensable" man to nearly a quarter of a century.

Unwavering, fearless, and always the champion of the "Little Guy," the commissioner and former federal jurist died of heart disease in hospital Saturday morning.

His death left the Major Leagues without a guiding genius for the first time since 1921 and placed tremendous importance on the National and American League winter meeting here December 11 and 12.

Landis was elected to a joint committee of the two leagues for another term expiring Jan. 12, 1946.

Judge Landis suffered a stroke Sunday and was placed under an hour before he died. He entered the hospital Oct. 2 suffering from a cold.

In compliance with Landis' wishes, there will be no funeral services. A cremation will take place privately and friends have been requested not to send flowers.

Until the Major League meetings, at 1 p.m., the commissioner's office will be conducted by his secretary, Leslie M. O'Connor.

DETROIT, Nov. 26 (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings, meeting Chicago Black Hawks for the first time this season, smothered them, 7-1 before 9,022 fans here Saturday night. The Hawks stayed in the game until midway of the first period when Murray Armstrong's two goals in 52 seconds put Detroit out of reach.

The Black Hawks, who have not defeated the Red Wings in a regularly scheduled game in Detroit since March 15, 1940, came from behind three times to tie the score.

Freighter, Cargo Are Total Loss

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 26 (CP) — Loss resulting from grounding of a freighter in Saint John harbor early Friday morning was estimated unofficially tonight by shipping authorities at upwards of \$5,000,000.

The vessel, believed to be a total loss, was almost broken in two. Its construction cost was about \$3,500,000 and cost of replacing it under present-day conditions would be from \$5,000,000 to \$6,000,000. The cargo was said to have been worth about \$1,500,000. In addition, considerable expenditure will be necessary to clear away the wreckage.

Most of the cargo, in holds under water, was a loss owing to difficulties of conducting salvage work beneath the water.

Included mail, and some was saved. Bags destined for overseas were piled up at various points in the harbor.

A strong tide swept the freighter upon a reef after a tugboat's towline snapped while the vessel was being manoeuvred just after leaving her dock. Half of the wreck was under water tonight; grinding on rocks which have been asserted broken the boat into halves.

Police found it necessary to warn the public against violating Defence of Canada regulations by taking pictures of the wreck.

HALIFAX, Nov. 26 (CP) — Canadians on the west coast are still in danger from the Japanese. Cmdr. C.M. Wassell of the United States Navy, veteran of Pacific fighting, declared in an interview here today.

"The war is far from over in the Pacific," said the officer-surgeon. "Who won the Navy Cross for evacuating wounded from Java, and many others, declared in an interview here today.

"Canadians on the west coast are still in jeopardy," he added. "Canadian ships are being held in the Pacific. I firmly believe that the Japanese know the west coast waters better than did the Canadian Admiralty."

Conversion: While the Government hopes a good many of the Home Defence troops to be sent overseas will volunteer and become General Service soldiers before they go, there will be a time limit fixed.

It may be the beginning of the end of their embarkation leave or perhaps the time they go aboard ship.

From the point of view of efficiency and discipline, it is desired that there be no distinction between soldiers overseas whether they were originally drafted or volunteers.

It is recognized, however, that a draftee who agrees to convert to General Service after he is overseas is not a volunteer in any sense of the word and hence the deadline will likely be fixed at shortly before sailing time.

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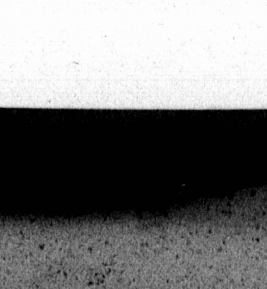

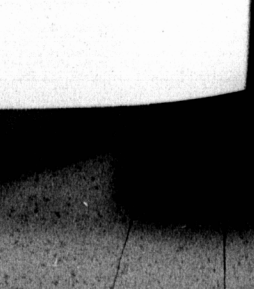
This War—Four Years Ago
