The death occurred on Friday morning December 27th of one of our best known citizens, James D. Musick, age 46.

The late Mr. Musick had been a great sufferer for the last 19 years, when he developed rheumatism and in spite of all medical skill and attention he never regained his health, but was able to be around. Although such a great cripple, he was always cheerful and uncomplaining.

Holy Communion: A revival of the Covenant. Feast after feasts thus comes and passes by; Yet passing, points to the glad feast above, Saving sweet foretastes of the festal joy.

The Lamb's great bridal feast of bliss and love.

Rev. Dr. Ramsay spoke from the text 1 Cor. 12-23, 24. "The Lord Jesus, the same night in which he was betrayed took bread; and when he had given thanks he brake it and said, take, eat; this is my body which is broken for you; this do in remembrance of me." The Church may not agree as to the meaning of some of these words, but they do imply the presence of the Christ and as in the breaking of the alabaster box of ointment the aroma thereof filled the house so the presence of the Christ in our Sacramental service should fill every crevice of our souls and create in us a passion for the Christ whose passion for us led him to the Cross. We should look at the Cross through the window of the sacrament. It is a means of grace, a pledge of our union with Christ and a bond or outer expression of our union with each other. We are enjoined to take it. There must be an act of Faith. We must appropriate it. Preceding the service ten were admitted to membership in the Church, six by letters from other churches and four by profession of faith. 317 partook in communion.

There was an attendance of 413 in the Sunday School, but it is hoped that the number will be increased to over 500 before the Easter season.

In the evening service Rev. Mr. Brown gave an address on "Fellowship" setting forth some of the obstacles which prevent a realization of the sweet spirit of unity and brotherhood, and pointing out the way in which an abiding fellowship may be enjoyed. His text was 1 John, 1-7. "If we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another and the blood of Jesus Christ, His son, cleanse us from all sin."

There was an anthem at both services, Mrs. Roy Cudmore taking the solo part in the morning and in the evening Mr. Percy D. Williams sang as a solo, "The King of Love."

An earnest appeal was made for the congregation to participate heartily in the services of this Week of Prayer.

Life becomes rich and full of meaning as we read and understand our Bible. Joy, Sorrows, Troubles, Death, in the Word we find the way to meet and express and experience all. Vision for strength, desire for righteousness, will to goodness, we find them all in God's Word.

2. Communion.

Through nature, through public worship, through daily hourly prayer we may seek the life more abundant. Prayer is the present day's greatest need. Our Churches need prayer. All of ourselves need prayer and more prayer. Jesus sets us the great example, in all his earthly life, in the meeting of every emergency, in every need and every circumstance he communed the Father. Without communion with God our lives are shallow and ineffective and fruitless. Through prayer let us seek depth of life, fruitfulness, usefulness.

3. Service.

God, through His Word and His Church calls us to service. The Christian life is not expressed in rest, in easy, lazy leisure. It is a pathway of usefulness, a challenge to sacrificial service. Our Churches should not be hospitals but places of power. "The Son of God goes forth to war, who follows in His train?" Are you unsatisfied? Are you ill content? Do you feel your life to be poor and small and limited? Christ calls us to a life more abundant. Through His Word, through communion with God, through courageous, sacrificial service let us press toward that fullness of life that only He can give.

The evening sermon "Frivolity," was a stirring message and challenge very specially needed in these days of aimless living and obscured ideals.

The morning anthem, very impressively sung by the full choir under Miss Spencer's direction was Sir Arthur Sullivan's setting of "Turn Thy Face from my sins." At this evening service the anthems were "Build thee more stately mansions O my soul," (Andrews) and Whittier's worshipful "Dear Lord and Father of mankind," in the setting of Prof. W. E. Fletcher.

DEMONSTRATION IN BOSTON AGAINST KILLING OF RUNNERS BY COASTGUARD

BOSTON, Jan. 4.—Coastguard recruiting officers stationed on Boston Common and the South Station where recruiting posters were destroyed by groups of demonstrators, were absent from their posts this afternoon. After having taken their stations as usual today and replacing the posters that had been destroyed, they left about two hours later, taking with them the signs and equipment. The recruiting station on the Common was attacked yesterday by a group of demonstrators shortly after the adjournment of a mass meeting in Faneuil Hall called in protest of the killing by coastguardsmen of three run-runners of Newport, R. I., last Sunday. The posters were ripped from their standards and trampled under foot. Their iron frames were bent and kicked about the walk. The attending officer was powerless to resist.
