WHO WAS FRED FRASER?—The St. John Times says: "Mr. Fred Fraser, was a young man, spent some time in St. John last fall. Beyond the fact that he had lived in Rumford, and had lived in New Glasgow before coming to St. John, nothing was known of him here.

NORTH MILTON RED CROSS.—The annual meeting of the North Milton Red Cross was held at the home of Mrs. Herbert Coles on Thursday evening, Feb. 22nd. The following is a list of the work done, during the year: 48 day shirts, 19 pyjama suits, 55 pairs socks, 10 Xmas stockings. At a concert and supper held on Feb. 15th the sum of ninety dollars (\$90.00) was realized. Fifty dollars of this was sent to the Red Cross Headquarters.

It is a bright, breezy journal containing interesting, well-written articles and is excellently illustrated, the cartoons, which are decidedly good, being drawn by a returned soldier.

A SPLENDID SOCIETY.—The British and Foreign Sailors' Society, a lively branch of which is in this city, with the aid of the local authorities, provided for all the men who were rescued (off the North East Coast of Ireland) from the torpedoed "Laurentic" and many of their relatives who came from a distance. A few wounded who are still in hospital are visited daily by local ladies as well as by the Port Missionary of the Sailors' Society. To convey the bodies of those whose relatives wished to remove them to their homes but lacked the means, this Society also provided hearses.

IN PUGILISTIC ANNALS.—Friday's Halifax Chronicle says: "This is the birthday of several ring worthies, ancient and modern, of more or less prominence in fistic circles. Joe Lannan, who was well known as a heavyweight in the Sullivan and Corbett eras, was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., fifty-two years ago today. He defeated a number of second raters, but lost to Jake Kilrain and to George Godfrey, the colored fighter, who also belonged to Charlottetown. Benny Kaufman, real name Jake Flinkman, the little Jewish featherweight battler, was born in Russia on March 1, 1899, and began fighting ten or twelve years ago. Tommy Maloney, New York welterweight, was born in the Big Village, of Irish parentage, twenty-four years ago today. Another native of New York to be born on the first day of March is Battling Reddy, the Italian-American featherweight, whose real moniker is Louis Nobile. Reddy has been scrapping in the ring since 1910, but, while a fair boxer, has never set the world afire with enthusiasm for his prowess.

VANITY'S VISIONS.

That plaits will play a large part in the spring styles in skirts and suits is certainly a foregone conclusion. In some shape or other they appear on a majority of the new designs offered for our approval and acceptance. Even the chemise dresses are laid in plaits, especially if they are made of serge or other twilled plain material. An inspection of the newest models now being displayed gives ample proof that plaits have, almost without exception to the various designers, not of course in every case in the same way, for the methods in which they are employed are legion.

DON'TS FOR BUYERS

Don't let the dealer weigh his hand.

Don't let the dealer tear off a heavy piece of paper weighing a half ounce and put it on top of the scale before weighing you a half-pound of boiled ham at forty cents a pound, thereby short-changing you over one cent on a twenty-cent transaction.

Don't let him put a heavy wooden dish on the scale and then out in butter or lard without allowing the weight of the dish.

Don't let him throw the meat on the scale and then brag it off before the scales is through vibrating, and say, "Forty-cents," when it is only thirty-five cents' worth. Insist on reading the weight yourself.

Don't let the dealer send you sale slips marked: Sugar, twenty-five cents; roast of beef, eighty cents, with out the weighing on the slip. You have no come-back then. But if the weight is on the slip you can reweigh the articles find out if he has short-changed you by short weighing.

Don't leave the trimming of your meat with the butcher. Many butchers are very accommodating about trimming the meat, especially on orders by telephone. If you complain to the butcher that you have been short-weighted, he will promptly tell you that
