ANGUS AUGUSTINE MCLELLAN.

Angus Augustine McLellan died at Indian River on June 7th, after an illness that lasted only one week. Through the assistance of a rigorous constitution but disease seemed to claim him for the fate of mankind. He was born at Indian River, the son of the late Augustus McLellan, and Ann McIntyre. He lived his whole life there. He was married in 1876 to Mary Jane McLellan, daughter of the late Joseph McLellan, who survives him. The members of the family are Joseph G. and Augustine, both at home, Bernard, Indian River; Gervase, Berlin, N.H.; Mrs. E.B. Babine, Bath, Maine; Amelia, Indian River; and Clara, teacher.

The funeral was held at Indian River, on June 10, and was largely attended. The pallbearers were John Cameron, Robert Easter, Alex. Sinclair, P.S. McIntyre, James McIntyre and Cyrena McIntyre. A High Mass of Requiem was sung by the pastor, Rev. Mgr. Gillis, and the service at the grave was conducted by Rev. J.J. McDanald, P.P. Mr. McLellan was decidedly one of the best known and most highly respected men in Indian River parish. For integrity of character he was prominently conspicuous, his word once given was ever held sacred. He was quiet, dignified, not letting the right hand know what the left hand doeth. Every cause that appealed to him as deserving he espoused with effective fervor, and every vice that thrust itself forward he steadily opposed. He was generously public spirited, yet jealously guarded the sanctity of the home. In effect he was a man that has made the world the better for having lived, and his memory will be held sacred by his many sorrowing friends.

Mr. McLellan had travelled considerably, having visited the eastern provinces and the western provinces of Canada, and also several of the Western States. He was well acquainted with the people of the places that he had visited and the interesting events that he had observed.

Hints for the Motorist

TIMING THE CAM SHAFT

W. R. writes: I am putting new cam shaft gears and crankshaft into a six cylinder engine. How can I time the gear, when all the pistons have been taken out? Answer: Usually the crankshaft gear and the camshaft gear are keyed to their respective shafts in a certain definite position, and there is a certain tooth marked on the other gear, thus bringing the crankshaft and camshaft into the correct angular relation. There should be marks on the flywheel corresponding with dead center positions and with the opening and closing times of each and every valve and each of the pistons are out by watching the valve push-rods and the fly-wheel markings, you can tell whether the valves are correctly set or not.

TIRE CHANGE EFFECTS MILE-AGE READING

J. writes: My car was equipped with 34 x 4 inch tires, but I have put on tires of the 35 x 4 1/2 inch size. How much difference will this make in the odometer reading in going 100 miles. The speedometer is geared to the transmission. What can be done to make it read correctly? Answer: When your odometer reads 100 miles you will really have gone practically 103 miles. The only means of correcting it is to have the speedometer fixed. It gives the speedometer you better control in the manufacturer of your speedometer as to this, giving him the make, model and number of your car and explaining the tire change that you have made.

IGNITION TIMING TROUBLE

F. G. S. writes: I am getting very low gasoline economy with my Ford, although I drive with the carburetor adjustment nearly closed. At starting, black smoke comes from the exhaust in clouds, with the adjustment open only enough to start on. I can move the spark lever all the way over without making any difference in the engine speed. Can you make any suggestions? Answer: Are you sure that the spark linkage has not become disconnected somehow, so that the spark lever does not move the times? Even if this is not the case, it may be that the timer is set too late, for a late spark occasion very low fuel economy. It is not surprising that you get black smoke at starting, but you better examine the carburetor and see that it does not flood because of the float or float-valve being deranged. The choke on your carburetor intake does not stick closed, does it? This would make such an overrich mixture as to waste lots of gasoline and to prevent the speeding up of the engine under advanced spark.

GERMAN MILITARIST PLOT TO OVERTHROW GOVERNMENT.

BERLIN, June 29.—"No acute danger of a revolt exists at present." Such is the guarded wording of an ominous official notice just issued here. It is intended to reassure apprehensive Germans who believe the latest alarmist rumor that strong Red army is organizing and drilling in Germany in preparation for a new ultra-Red revolution. Despite all reassurances, however, many specialists and close followers of international developments in Germany believe that a fresh Red revolution may break out within two months. Indeed some observers even consider that another revolution followed by a counter revolution is inevitable.

The fact is that Germany is still travelling at express speed toward civil war. Political and economic developments both are sharpening and forcing the issue of a great civil struggle to a finish. Bolshevism or reconstruction—that is still the vital question for Germany, and is still unanswered.

Macdonald was the arrival in the city last evening of his brother Percy, after an absence of 15 years in British Columbia. 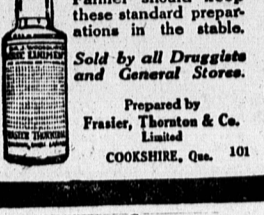
