PLERISCITE JUNE 25—Prince Edward Island's plebiscite on an amendment to the Prohibition Act will be held June 25. It was announced officially yesterday. Basic question to be asked in the plebiscite will be the retaining of the act under which liquors may be sold for medicinal use only or the introduction of a system allowing the sale of beer and wine by permit for beverage purposes while retaining the cause making it necessary for medical prescriptions for the purchase of stronger alcoholic liquors.

German advance in this vital area in front of the extended Maginot line. At least 15 German planes were destroyed.

DEADLY BOMBING

In operations of this sort the R.A.F. has been using low level bombing with its deadly accuracy but inevitable risk from ground defences of the light automatic type. Planes often drop as low as 100 feet, releasing their bombs in "sticks" or patterns, straddling the long narrow columns of troops and transports in the knowledge there will be enough hits to compensate for the added risks.

On the home front authorities heard without comment Berlin radio broadcasts that the Reich army was "standing at England's door" with fighters less than an hour away by air.

"German planes, a German announcer boasted, "already are within easy reach of the important English port of Harwich; more than that, they have bases for direct attack against the whole of England."

Harwich is less than 125 miles from the Nazi-held Dutch mainland. British officials rushed their air defence program. The R.A.F. issued a new call for volunteers to train as pilots and air crews.

The news of an invasion by parachutists brought new streams of sharpshooters into police stations to join the force of minute men who have been dubbed "parashooters."

The Admiralty announced tonight the destroyer Valentin had been beached after being damaged by a German air attack off the coast of Holland.

Other German claims of British losses at sea were brushed aside earlier as "entirely groundless." "No British warship," said the Admiralty in its first statement, "has been sunk, set on fire or seriously damaged since the Ger-

man invasion of the low countries with the exception of the submarine Seal. Later the Admiralty issued this statement:—

"Since the issue of the communique earlier today denying German claims to have sunk various British warships, information has been received that one destroyer, H. M. S. Valentine, Commander H. J. Buchanan, was damaged by an air attack off the Dutch coast and subsequently beached."

"Details of casualties have not yet been received but are believed to be slight. Next or kin will be informed as soon as possible."

Military experts meanwhile saw Switzerland's status growing more perilous by the hour, and regarded it as almost certain that the French flank would be undertaken the moment the battle of the Meuse reaches the peak of its intensity.

This belief was based, in part at least, on the German radio broadcast that the conquest of most of the Netherlands had "been essential for the shift of essential forces to be shifted elsewhere at a moment's notice."

"Tonight the British Broadcasting Corporation began a series of talks on the need for precautions to keep the population on the alert. Spread of the war, first to Norway and then to the low countries, has removed the need for the contraband control bases in the British Isles, and the three stations at Kirkwall in the Orkneys, and the Downs and Weymouth on the south coast of England, are being closed, an economic warfare official said.

U. S. NAVAL

United States is not vulnerable to direct attack by any means: whatever "save those with which a thoroughly modern navy and air force can deal adequately."

Observing that future consideration of a two-ocean fleet may be necessary, the committee recommended extension of the existing submarine and naval air bases in the Panama Canal area. It said it might be desirable to consider the question of building a canal across Nicaragua.

"In the Atlantic," the report said, "we must improve our bases at Hampton Roads, Va.; Pensacola, Fla.; Guantanamo Bay, Cuba; and complete the bases recently authorized at Quonset Point, R. I.; Jacksonville, Fla.; and San Juan, P. R."

"Serious consideration should be given the question of acquiring, if possible, places in the Caribbean area for additional United States naval bases or to prevent their use as enemy air or submarine bases, from which to launch an attack against continental United States and the Panama Canal. "A fleet of air bases in the southeast corner of the Caribbean would undoubtedly add to the security of that area as well as to the ability of the United States fleet to insure the integrity of the Monroe Doctrine. In view of present European developments it may be necessary to proceed with some of these proposed projects in the near future."

"Our army must be adequate to defend the bases from which our fleet and our aircraft operate. We must, in addition, have an air force

capable of being concentrated on either coast, superior in number to the greatest number of enemy air force and equipped aircraft possessed by any naval power or conceivable combination of powers.

The report also recommended that the United States Navy should be organized to prevent an enemy from establishing in either ocean a base in this hemisphere while our fleet is engaging the enemy's fleet."

Communist Party Declared Illegal Here

OTTAWA, May 15—(CP)—The Ontario supreme court today endorsed a government action to suppress the Communist Party in Canada by declaring it illegal.

After an assizes jury had convicted three men of publishing and circulating a pamphlet tending to prejudice the safety of the state and the efficient prosecution of the war, Mr. Justice E. R. B.

Cherrier granted a motion on behalf of the Ontario attorney-general and declared the Communist Party an illegal organization. Harry Binder, one of the accused and former Parliamentary press gallery representative of the Daily Clarion, banned Toronto Communist Party members from membership in the Communist party and declared the pamphlet expressed the platform of the party.

The 26-year-old newspaperman was sentenced today to three years in penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$2,000 or serve an additional year. His brother, Louis Binder, 22, former private in the Royal Canadian Engineers, and Arthur Roy Saunders, 27, a Dominion civil servant, drew identical sentences of 2 1/2 years and a fine of \$1,000 or an additional six months in prison.
