Bishops Hand Over Control to Japs TOKYO, April 28.—The conference of English and American Episcopal Bishops, now in session here, announced yesterday it had decided to hand over to the Japanese entire control of the ecclesiastical affairs of missionary work in Osaka and Tokyo. This control has been held by the foreign missionary bishops for the past sixty years. The conference appointed two Japanese Bishops to whom the transfer of the work will be made today.

Two Railroad Unions Ask For More Pay CHICAGO, April 28.—Request for a return to wages in effect prior to July 1, 1921, was made of the Railroad Labor Board today by the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Shop Laborers. The petition affects twenty-eight railroads and 175,000 employees. A formal request for pay increase has also been filed with the board by the Order of Railroad Expressmen. The request is for a ten-cent-an-hour advance for each of the 70,000 expressmen of the organization, making a total annual increase of slightly more than \$17,000,000, which would affect every carrier in the country.

AMENDMENTS TO GAMBLING CODE ADOPTED. OTTAWA, April 28.—Amendments to the criminal code in respect to gambling were given third reading in the Commons. These prohibit the advertising, printing, posting, selling or supplying or offering to sell or supply. (1) Other than on the premises of an association lawfully conducted during the actual progress of a race meeting thereon, any tips, selections, odds, winning money prizes, pari-mutuels payments, or any similar intelligence with respect to or applicable to any horse race, whether such race be held within or without the Dominion of Canada, and whether at the time such race has or has not taken place; (2) any information intended to assist in or intended for use in connection with bookmaking, pool-selling, betting or wagering upon any fight, game, sport or race, has or has not taken place.
