Says Canada Should Attract More British Capital

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 28.—No country in the world offers such a safe field for investment as Canada, in the opinion of Sir Harold Beachamp, director of the Bank of New Zealand, and for fifteen years chairman of that institution, who reached here recently on his return to the Antipodes after a tour through Canada and Europe.

"Canadian securities have been regarded with disfavor in Great Britain ever since the Grand Trunk Pacific bondholders' failure to realize on their investment, but the hesitant attitude of Old Country people towards putting their money in Canadian ventures is wearing off," said Sir Harold.

RED CROSS AND WOMEN'S INSTITUTES HOLD DENTAL CLINICS

In co-operation with Avonlea, Cymbrria, Stirling, Mayfield and Pleasant Valley Women's Institutes the Red Cross has just successfully completed a series of dental clinics held in five centres when 113 children from the following schools received dental treatment: Cavendish, Mayfield, North Rustico, Wheatley River, Anglo Rustico, Hope River, Stanley Bridge and Pleasant Valley.

Ever since the Red Cross health work started in the schools the nurses have been urging the parents to have the dental defects of the children corrected, and have encouraged the young people in the daily care of their teeth. Red Cross reports show however, that in the rural schools, 85 per cent of the children have dental defects. This very high rate is largely due to the fact that such long distances have to be traversed in order to get to a dentist, so the children's teeth are neglected and allowed to decay.

It was to overcome this difficulty that a group of Institutes and the Red Cross decided to hold clinics and thus make dental treatment convenient for the parents by taking the dentist to the district. Dr. Geo. Green of Charlottetown and Hunter River did the dental work assisted by one of the Red Cross nurses, and was kept exceedingly busy during the two weeks devoted to the clinics, as over 260 fillings were put in and 92 extractions done. All arrangements in the districts were made by the Institutes, which secured suitable places for the clinics and made appointments for the children. A survey of the teeth was made in the schools by Dr. Green and Miss Wilson previous to the holding of the clinics, when each child was given a card showing the defective teeth and giving an estimate of the cost of treatment.

The continuation of such clinics would be a boon to the country districts in the preservation of child health, and deserves the support of many communities not within easy access of a dentist.

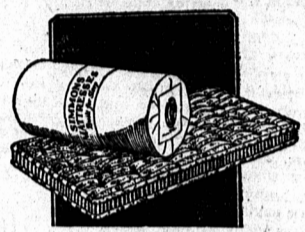

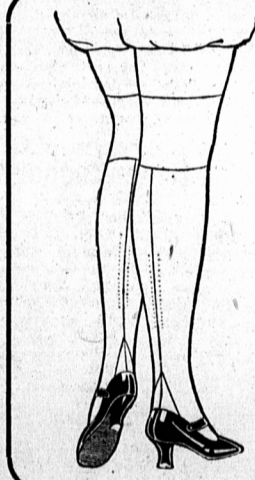
