St. George Credit Union Ltd. Meeting

The second annual meeting of the St. George Credit Union Limited was held in De Gras Marsh School on January 27, 1938. The Vice-President, Mr. Eugene Delorie presided. The meeting opened by a violin solo "The Road to the Isle" composed by Mr. John J. McCormac, Launceston.

The shareholders, by their large attendance and interest shown in the meeting throughout, was a fitting recognition of their desire for the success of the Union.

After the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted, the President, Mr. Daniel M. McLean in his report reviewing the year's business, stated that the members were much richer now materially from their knowledge gained in their study club activities and the benefits they have received through the systematic saving system developed in their Credit Union.

A great deal of study was required and although not encouraging at first we had through the spirit of co-operation among the members together with the valuable assistance of Dr. J. T. Groleau, Charlottetown, and an address by Rev. J. Rooney, Carleton Place, reviewing the Antigonish Movement deemed it wise to organize a Credit Union.

On January 21, 1937, eighteen Charter members with a subscribed capital of eighteen shares applied for our Charter which was granted on February 9, 1937, and on March 11, 1937, our Credit Union office was first open for business. So today we are marching forward in the front ranks of the Co-operative movement on P. E. Island.

After explaining the duties of the Directors and Committees and stressing the importance of selecting officers who have a keen interest in the activities and progress of their Credit Union, he reviewed the Maritime setting of the Co-operative movement, the benefits the working class have received. "It brought them to a higher standard of living. The existing evils of depression among the vast groups of the population, affected control of their political and economic life. As help comes to those who help themselves, they raised themselves from the masses into the classes and to-day the evils of depression which are on the Maritime Provinces.

In conclusion I wish to say it is your members by your savings and co-operation are going to make this movement among you a success each individual can measure his own ability and no one can forecast what a group of people can accomplish by working together for a common good and this in view study, more study and always study.
