The maid of honor, Flossie Stafford, niece of the bride was dressed in white silk tulle trimmed with silk lace. She carried a basket of flowers and silver tray containing the ring. Mr. H. Henry supported the groom. After congratulations of the many friends numbering about 60 was over, the party retired to the dining room where a sumptuous supper was served. After a few hours pleasantly spent Mr. and Mrs. Rogers accompanied by a few friends, drove to their future home in Freetown. Squid have likewise arrived and made the best of bait or hake though not very pleasant animals to handle. There is no one looking for mackerel round here at present and not supposed to be many in this vicinity.—Rev. S. C. Shaw of Dundas who was visiting here, has been seriously ill at Deacon Scott's but is somewhat better at time of writing.—Though wishing to detract nothing from the merits of Edward Whelan, an ardent admirer of his political principles and his herculean work, in your article of the 18th you speak of him that, he succeeded "in liberating the tenants of the Island from their thralldom" you give him credit for too much. That he was a leading spirit in that work is true, that he bent his mighty genius to the accomplishment of that humane—that patriotic task is correct, but the movement commenced in the east Point District in the early forties, gathered strength as the people began to feel their power under the inspiration of Whelan and others, and culminated some eleven years after his death in the overthrow, the tyrannical and unchristian landlord system.

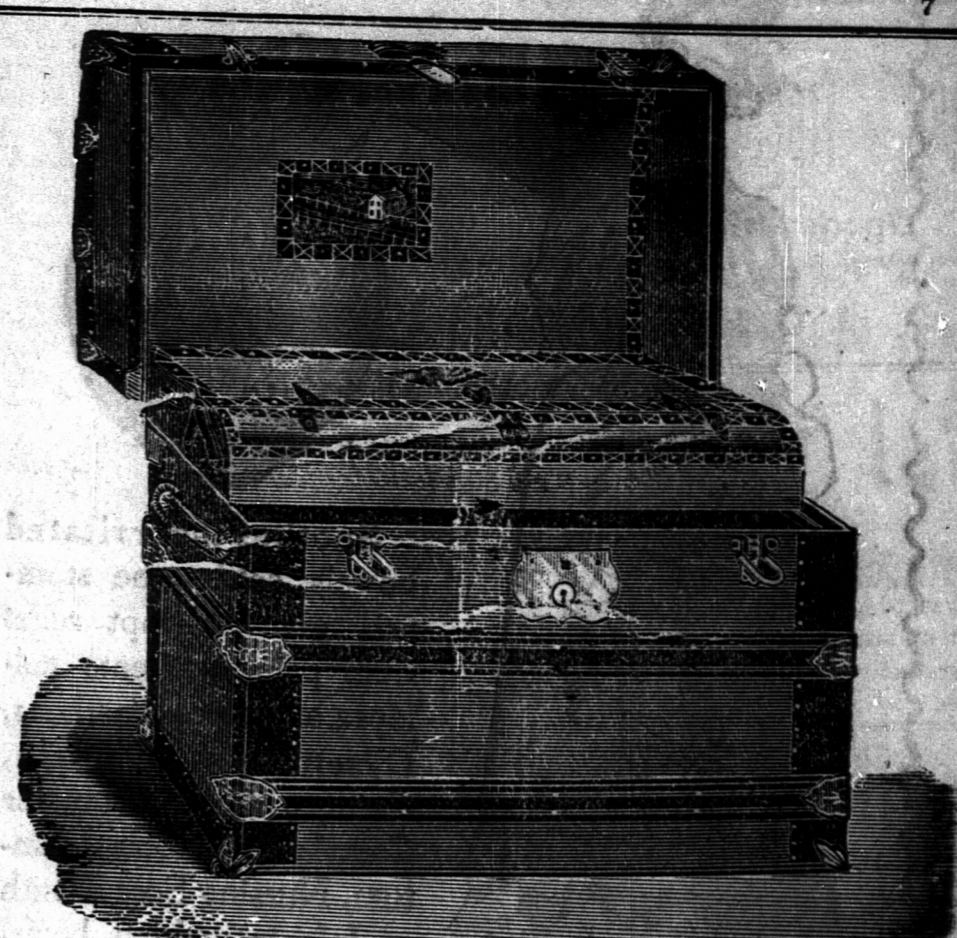

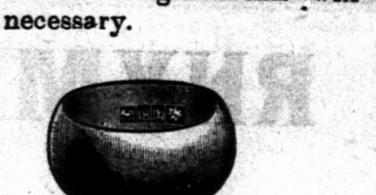
