A message from Capt. McLean, her commander, states that the engine room is full of water from the sea level. The steamer also has water in No. 4 hold and reports indicate that her bottom is badly crumpled. Up to the present no information has been received as to the cause of the wreck. The Commander carried 6500 tons of wheat and 200 tons general cargo which it is supposed will be for the most part totally damaged.

Captain J. D. McKenzie, the commander of the ill-fated steamer who is here spending his six weeks annual leave, was to have gone to St. Pierre this morning on the S.S.
