Saints Lose To Abegweits 5-3

Converted Try In Last Session Enough Margin For Locals To Take Opener.

Taking advantage of a fast forward attack in the second half of the game, Abegweits were able to force a man over for a clean try which was afterwards converted to win the opening game of the local gridiron season against Saint Dunstan's by a score of 5 to 3, the University squad also making their count in this half on a penalty kick ten minutes before the final whistle.

Yesterday's opener, although far short of the sensational, was nevertheless fairly good ball for early season. Both back lines showed plenty speed and stamina, but lacked finish in ball handling, where many golden opportunities were lost.

In the first half and for the greater part of the last session, the red and white team had a big edge in territory play, but as above mentioned lacked scoring punch when the opportunity afforded.

Abegweits forwards scrummed and followed well, but most of their speed was wasted due to slow breaking up after a heel-out. In fact both lineups would benefit greatly if they would break from scrum more quickly and fan out. However, it's easy to criticize, especially when teams are playing their first game of the season.

Saint Dunstan's and Abegweits have fast, heady and rugged lines

this year and it is expected that plenty good things will be heard from them before "Jack Frost" introduces the "swan song."

It was lofty Bill Powers who crossed for the Abegweits try in the second half on a pass from "Brick" Gormley, who later converted. The Saints, after realizing on a penalty kick, turned loose everything at their command for a try, but Abegweits, with the game practically sewed up, thwarted every red and white attempt to go over their line.

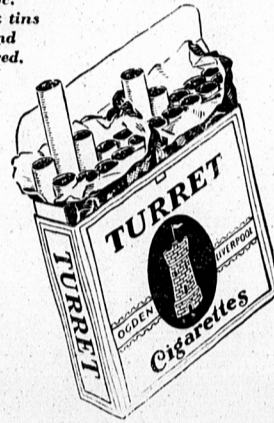

SHARKEY BACK CHTOWN GOLF IN LIMELIGHT

(By Edward J. Neil, Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 13.—Jack Sharkey, man of moods, given to gusty displays of rage and lack of control that have ruined many a heavyweight spectacle, finally has paid part of his debt to boxing.

There was new life, new interest today in the heavyweight division, the barometer by which the success of the game as a whole is measured, and it was due to but one reason—the "Sailor's" spectacular thumping of Primo Carnera the ogre man, in the biting winds that swept Ebbets Field last night.

Although a complete accounting was still lacking, Jimmy Johnston, the most versatile promoter since the late Tex Rickard, said today that 25,000 persons paid from \$3.00 to \$15.00 and braved the football weather to see the first thorough testing of the Italian giant.

The gross receipts were \$129,700 and with government taxes subtracted, \$107,070 was left for the fighters and the management. The warriors split \$53,535 evenly, about \$26,767 each, and there was plenty of profit for the promoter who finally has forced his mammoth rival, Madison Square Garden, to capitulate and take him into the fold.

Johnston moves into the Garden the fifteenth of this month to take complete charge of boxing, Vice President and General Manager at a \$25,000 a year salary, plus a chunk of stock, and he brings with him a rejuvenated heavyweight division. As soon as he is settled he plans to match Sharkey and Carnera for a return battle indoors this winter. He also plans another Sharkey-Tommy Loughran go and a bout between Carnera and Paulino Uzcudun.
