It was noted, however, that the United States dollar held its own against leading foreign exchanges and that grains and cotton were backward throughout. Low-yield bonds, also, the first to feel the effects, usually, of an inflationary scare, maintained a strong position. U. S. Government securities were steady.

Earthquakes, Storms And Floods Cause Heavy Loss

A series of disasters caused by earthquakes, storms and floods, striking almost simultaneously in various parts of the world Friday, occurred at widely separated areas through Europe, the near East and the Orient.
Five were killed and 16 gravely injured when a sharp quake shook central Japan, starting 1,000 fires and wrecking heavy damage in Tokyo and Osaka. Communication lines were disrupted and many homes wrecked.

tailed utterances and a gift of imagery such as few poets can equal; but in him it is again the artist that dominates the lyricist; his power of execution is greater than his inspiration, and his verse is metrical and brilliant far more than it is passionately deep and sincere, such, for example, as an ode of Shelley's, ('To the Skylark'). In other words, it is generally in the style, rather than in the newness of ideas, that the individuality of a French writer triumphs, and the personal accent we look for in literature, the French manifest not so much in what they say, but in the way they say it.

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Of their Latin models. In fact during this period lyricism finds better expression in the great prose writers, Bossuet, Massillon, J. J. Rousseau and Bernardin de St. Pierre. Andre Chénier was the first to restore some soul to French poetry in his lyrics which he sang during the horrors of the French Revolution. Then stepped forth Lamartine, the lyric poet 'par excellence,' revealing in his reposeful, tuneful lines, often sad, a beautiful and sympathetic side of French poetic emotion. A notable line of lyricists followed in Lamartine's footsteps; Alfred de Vigny and Victor de Laprade being among the foremost. Victor Hugo was master of too many instruments to be classified simply as a lyric poet, yet he was surely one of the greatest lyricists of all ages. However, even early in his career, the reaction against Romanticism was already beginning to be felt. Poetry was again becoming more and more an art and less and less a substance.
