

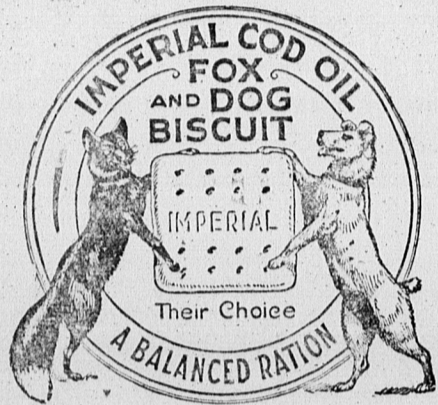

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OLD STEAMER IS BURNED IN BAY

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 14—(O. P.)—The wooden steamer Edmund Donald, for which Marshall Brothers paid \$124,215 in the spring of 1918, has been destroyed. Unfit for further service, she was taking up too much room at A. E. Hickman and Company's pier. So she was towed out to Freshwater Bay by the tug Hugh

D, anchored and set on fire. Marshall Brothers sold the vessel to N. Hansen for \$7,000 about five years ago. A. E. Hickman and Company later bought her at auction for \$1,000. After Marshall Brothers brought her here from Nova Scotia the Edmund Donald got a bad reputation as a loafer. She was purchased for the coal trade but did not prove satisfactory. For many years she lay anchored in the stream of St. John's harbor. A storm broke her adrift, and she was salvaged by an insurance company which later put her up at auction.
