### CONDITIONS OF ENTRANCE TO THE UNITED STATES

Sir.—In reply to inquiries addressed to the Immigration Agent at Saint John, N. B., I have been informed by him as follows:

"A head-tax of \$8 is charged to all aliens entering the United States. Those who have resided there previous to August, 1906 and remained continuously since, with exception of absence of not over a month or two each year, are exempt from this tax. Those who entered since August, 1906, and were admitted by a U. S. Immigration Inspector and a record of such fact made on books of port of entry are exempt.

"Canadians going to the United States on a short visit pay the head-tax and get a receipt which is signed by the Inspector or U. S. Immigration Inspector and on their return within six months the tax is refunded. A letter of identification might be accepted by the U. S. Inspectors as verification of their intention to return to Canada. Persons well known to the Inspectors are sometimes allowed to go without payment of tax, but this is at the discretion of the officials.

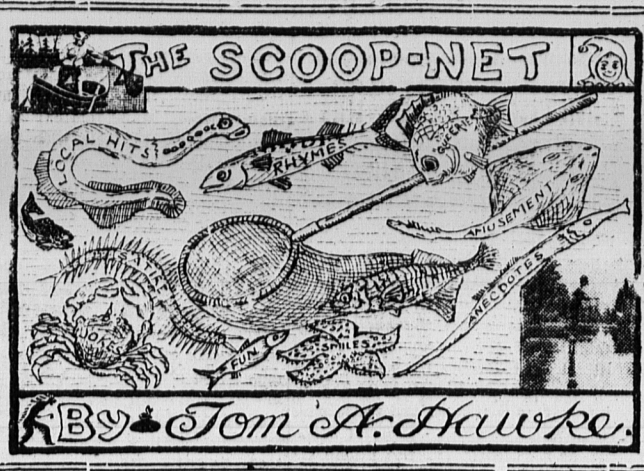
"It is difficult to tell the many reasons why persons may be debarr'd until the individual is inspected personally. Those who cannot read and write are absolutely debarr'd—although those over 55 years of age have some chance. Persons under 16 cannot travel alone and if accompanied by other than their parents or legal guardians must pay head-tax. Persons having arranged to take positions in the United States are debarr'd as contract labor in most all cases.

"The above statements may need variation in some cases, but are usually applicable. It is always best for travellers to carry documentary evidence to prove the points on which they base their claims. Many people have to be detained here until their cases are investigated by U. S. officials at the addresses in the placards to which they are destined, and if satisfactory reports are obtained they are allowed to proceed, otherwise they must remain in Canada. It is well for all to be prepared for such contingency as it is sometimes difficult to foresee what may become in the mind of the Inspector, something which would cause him to hold a person over for a Board hearing and investigation. Addresses should occur rate and particulars of births and nationalities, for much delay is caused by not being familiar with the names and other particulars which may be called for.

While the above requirements are not new, there is now a tendency to ward stricter enforcement than hitherto, and there appears to be a lack of information on this side of the border as to the existing conditions. For that reason the above statement is made public.

The days he was a boy.

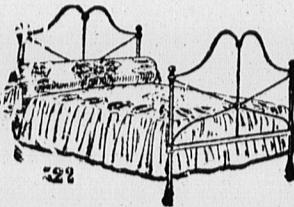
#### RUSSIANS FEEL IRON HEEL OF GERMANS

This officer said definitely that all the Russians were taken out of the ranks of the prisoners and summarily shot.

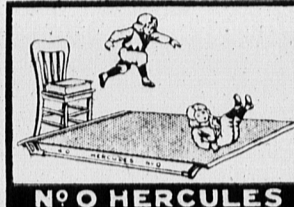

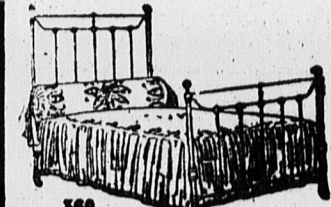
