BOSTON, Nov. 18—(AP)—Boston Bruins' management today challenged all of other National Hockey League clubs to play a wide open game here and offered to forfeit \$1,000 if its players failed to play that sort of hockey on the road.

"The policy of the Boston Bruins this year will be to play wide open hockey," a letter, signed by President Weston W. Adams and General Manager Arthur H. Ross and addressed to all the other club owners, read.

"Naturally, we will play open hockey in Boston because our fans are entitled to the best. We wish also to play open hockey on the road but we will do this only if opposing clubs will play open hockey in Boston.

"We challenge the presidents and managers of rival National Hockey Clubs to play this open type of hockey in Boston and we will agree to pay \$1,000 to any club against which we do not play open hockey on their home ice, provided that club will agree to pay \$1,000 to the Bruins any time it does not play open hockey in Boston."

"Any club that will not accept this challenge will be given the same sort of hockey game for game on their ice by the Bruins, which they play on Boston ice."

The Bruins, in one of the most open games played here in years, were outplayed last night when they bowed to the New York Rangers 6-1.

### Canadiens Favor Move

MONTREAL, Nov. 18—(CP)—The challenge of Boston Bruins to other clubs in the National Hockey League to play a wide open game or forfeit \$1,000 found favor in Montreal tonight.

Said Manager Cecil Hart of Montreal Canadiens: "I think the Boston scheme is a splendid idea; I'm all for open hockey."

Said League President Frank Calder: "I find the proposal interesting."

"As far as Canadiens are concerned, we've been playing wide open hockey and will continue to do so," said Hart, commenting on the challenge from the Bruin management.

"As far as I know, everyone is in complete accord with the idea of playing an open game," Calder declared. "That's what the customers want."

### Always Leaf Policy

TORONTO, Nov. 18—(CP)—The idea of Boston Bruins' management for other National Hockey League clubs to post \$1,000 each to insure "wide open hockey" leaves Conny Smythe entirely cold.

"That's like all other Boston ideas. They're just trying to pass the buck on to the other clubs," said the Manager of Toronto's Maple Leafs. "They don't need to send those letters to us. The Leafs always played open hockey. We scored 100 goals last year more than any other club and you don't get goals by mail. We have always played wide open hockey in Boston and packed them in. I can't say the same of them in Toronto," Smythe added.

## Murphy Wins Bout From Jim Spencer

Dr. John Murphy of Medford, Mass., holder of the world's junior heavyweight wrestling crown, and a modern "Houdini" of the game, took just 31 minutes to turn back another challenger for his title when he defeated Jim Spencer at the Forum last night in two straight falls in the main event of Joey McDonald's card. The Chicago "badman" lost the first fall after 24 minutes of grappling and went out in short order in the second in the time of seven minutes. The blonde-haired Murphy won on a body press in both instances after sending his opponent groggy with a series of his famous "drop kicks".

Fast as greased lightning and able to wriggle out of any holds that his opponent pinned on him, Murphy was the master from the start. Spencer had him in difficulties twice but the winner came back both times to give his opponent a turn at wriggling in agony on the mat. The Doctor proved that he is one of the most scientific wrestlers in the game and at the same time able to adapt himself to whatever method his opponent chooses. He also proved this last night whenever the going got tough and rugged and beat Spencer at his own game.

Spencer although his tactics didn't draw favor with the crowd proved plenty game. Many times Murphy had him in difficulties on the mat but the Chicago wrestler generally managed to bear it until able to break free of the holds. Other times he sought the safety of the ropes; but discretion is oftentimes the better part of valor.

In the preliminary to the Spencer-Murphy bout, Vic Butland of Moncton won from Bill Gill when referee Charlie Allen awarded him the bout when Gill failed to respond to repeated warnings of tangling Butland's head between the ropes. This bout was pleasing to the small crowd of fans although it didn't produce the action the main event did. Gill, till the showman of his "Eg Four" days when playing defence for the Moncton Hawks again received plenty of razzing but as usual "Rosy" just laughed them off and went about the business at hand.

## Hudson Scores Winning Goal

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18—A last-minute goal by Ron Hudson, formerly of Charlottetown Abegweits, broke a deadlock tonight and gave Pittsburgh Hornets a 3-2 win over Philadelphia Ramblers in the International-American Hockey League.

The win strengthened Pittsburgh's hold on first place in the league's western division.

Just 34 seconds of the game were left, with the score at 2-2, when the former Maritime Hockey League broke the ice with the winning goal. He took a pass from Billy Hudson to slip the rubber past goalie Bert Gardiner with an unbeat shot.

Bert Connolly, formerly with the Moncton Hawks, played with Philadelphia but failed to break into the scoring. He drew a penalty in the second frame for rough play.

## Delegates Gather At Regina For Opening Sessions Of Amateur Athletic Union

REGINA, Nov. 18—(CP)—Proposals to permit mingling of professional and amateur athletes to a far greater extent than the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada constitution provides awaited consideration tonight on the eve of the Union's 40th annual meeting.

Delegates from all parts of the Dominion will attend opening session of three days meeting tomorrow. Delegates to the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation meeting, concluded yesterday, are remaining for the senior gathering.

Canadian Amateur Hockey Association proposals to broaden the amateur code were expected to provide the fireworks. They would permit payment of athletes for time lost from work while competing, capitalization of athletic ability in obtaining employment, participation of professionals in one sport as amateurs in another, and games between amateur and professional teams.

Strong opposition was certain to come from A.A.U. officials, particularly those from eastern branches. A chief opponent is W. A. Fry, of Dunnville, Ont., who retires this year as president. Mr. Fry contends adoption of the "four point" proposals would bar Canada from international competition, including Olympic games.

Another controversial issue is expected to be the Central Ontario branch's suggestion the Norton H. Crow memorial award to the year's outstanding athlete in Canada be confined to men. Last year Alleen Meagher, Halifax girl sprinter, received the honor.

## Favorites Vanquished In U.S. Pro Golf Tourney

### Neutral Stand Is Adopted By Commission

(By EDDIE BRIETZ Associated Press Sports Writer)

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—(AP)—An Atlantic City no-decision fight between James J. Braddock and Joe Louis seemed a step nearer reality tonight.

The New York State Athletic Commission, which had been expected to oppose the fight, indicated today it would adopt a neutral stand.

The Commission intimated that if Braddock will sign articles, to fight Max Schmeling next June and post a \$5,000 binder, what he does outside of New York is his own affair.

Called before the boxing solons, Joe Gould, Braddock's manager, left a half hour session claiming a victory. "Why, I'll put that money up right away," he said.

Chairman John J. Phelan reminded Gould he had agreed to negotiate for no fights without the sanction of the Commission.

"That's right," replied Gould, pulling a sheaf of letters and telegrams from his pocket. "But here are offers for Braddock's services totalling more than \$1,000,000. At present I am entertaining one from Herman Taylor for Jim to fight Joe Louis in Atlantic City."

"This Commission has nothing to do with Atlantic City," said Phelan. "But we are interested in seeing that you carry out your agreement with us."

The attitude of the Commission struck observers as wanting to give Schmeling's interests all possible protection without trying to throw a monkey wrench into the Atlantic City machinery.

PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 18—In two 18-hole rounds of the United States Professional Golfers' Championship, defending champion Johnny Revolta of Chicago and three former champions, Gene Sarazen, Paul Runyan and Tommy Armour, were blown out of sight today in sharp explosions which left only a few favorites among the 16 survivors of 64 who qualified.

Harold McSpaden of Winchester, Mass., whose previous claim to fame was victory in the 1935 San Francisco open match play tournament, defeated Revolta one up at the 19th in the second round.

Armour, winner of the title in 1930 and runner up last year; Sarazen, champion in 1922-23 and '33, and Runyan, king two years ago, were knocked out in the first round. Armour bowed to Mortie Dutra of Detroit, 4 and 3; Runyan lost to Clarence Doser of Rochester, N.Y., 2 and 1, and Sarazen yielded to Jack Patroni of Shawnee-on-Deleware, Pa., on the 18th green, but the lambs who slew the butchers didn't last long. They were slaughtered in the afternoon.

There were at least two other results in the nature of upsets, second round victories by Victor Ghezzi of Deal, N.J., one up over Fay Coleman of Culver City, Calif., the qualifying medalist, and Jimmy Hines, Garden City, N.Y., 2 and 1, over Ray Mangrum of Pittsburgh.

Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., who now looms as the man to beat, and Tony Manero of Greensboro, N.C., reigning United States open champion, passed the test.

## Set Dates For Curling Play

## Leroy Haynes Knocks Out Abe Feldman

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 18—Leroy Haynes, Philadelphia negro heavyweight, made short work of the Brooklyn veteran, Abe Feldman, tonight, scoring a knockout in the second round of their 10-rounder in the Hippodrome.

Haynes scored 199 3-4 and Feldman, 180 1-4.

Haynes surprised the small gallery of 3,000 by flooring the rugged Feldman, rated tops as a heavyweight trial horse, four times before Referee Al Reich stopped the fight and waved the Brooklyn boy to his corner. The end came after 1:41 of the second round.

It was the first time Feldman had been knocked off his feet in five years of ring campaigning.

Off to a slow start, Haynes got down to business with the start of the second. He shot a left to the chin, followed by a right to the same spot and Feldman went down for a count of four.

He got to his feet in time to run into another left to the head. This one floored him for nine.

Haynes pressed his advantage with a series of hard lefts and rights to both head and body to score his third knockdown. Again Feldman took a count of nine.

A right to the jaw accounted for the fourth. The time-keeper had reached a count of four when Reich stopped the fight.

Feldman handed two good rights to Haynes' head to win the first round.

## McLarnin Is Favored To Take Ambers

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—(CP)—Jimmy McLarnin tonight ruled the betting favorite for his 10-round bout with Lou Ambers, lightweight champion at Madison Square Garden Friday night. Even though farther time is hard on the heels of the Vancouver better, the flaic faithful still respect his right-hand wallop and have made him the 4-5 choice.

The fighters have concluded training, Jimmy smacking his sparring mates around in a Manhattan gymnasium while Ambers conditioned himself at Summit, N.J. Both appeared in fine fettle but McLarnin looked to be in better form than when he was preparing for some of his recent tussles.

"I feel in better shape than I have during the last three years—that is physically—but my golf is way off," Jimmy said today.

### SIGNS AGREEMENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—(AP)—Sam Pian, manager of Barney Ross, world's welterweight champion, signed an agreement today for Ross to defend the title against Celerino Garcia, west coast Filipino, if Ross defeats Izzy Jannazzo, of New York, in their title fight here Nov. 27.

The fight would be held within 60 days of the Jannazzo fight if Ross emerges un injured. Guy Anselmi, Jannazzo's manager, signed a similar agreement.
