MEETINGS OF Lobster Packers

A meeting of the Lobster Packers and Fishermen was held at St. Louis Hall on Thursday evening, April 8th. Mr. James McGrath presiding.

Mr. W. H. Tidmarsh, the first speaker of the evening, reviewed the present critical conditions of the market, emphasizing the point that only strictly choice goods were in demand. His timely advice, no doubt, will result in more careful packing this season.

Mr. S. T. Gallant, Inspector of Fisheries, followed explaining a circular he had prepared offering suggestions along the lines of packing. Those present were convinced that the advice given would result in an improvement in this season's pack, which is most desirable in the interest of the industry.

Mr. Peter Bulger also addressed the meeting, after which a vote of thanks was tendered the speakers. A meeting of Lobster Packers and Fishermen was held at Trenchard Hall on Friday, April 9th, Mr. Peter Cahill presiding.

Mr. W. H. Tidmarsh pointed out the necessity of packing only strictly choice goods this season—goods that would keep for a reasonable length of time, as it is expected that sales will be slow this year.

Mr. S. T. Gallant, Inspector of Fisheries, dealt with the methods of packing which should be adopted to ensure goods that will meet the requirements of the market. Dr. Johnston then spoke dealing with the sanitary conditions of canneries. He approved of the suggestions given by the previous speakers as to the necessity of turning out a first-class article this season. He said that if dealers could depend on lobster keeping good for at least six or nine months they would be more inclined to give advances to packers. Hence, a special effort should be made to put up a standard article.

CHICAGO, April 9.—Two teams gained laps in the six-day bicycle race today, Madden and Magnin lapping the field this afternoon, Reliens and Degreves repeating the feat tonight. Their work placed these two teams on equal terms with Cory and McBeath, who previously had held a one-lap lead. The other teams all were a lap behind the three leaders, who had covered 1,770 miles, six laps at 11 o'clock, the 120th hour of the race. Cory and McBeath led in points with 181 1-2.

\$500,000,000 RECEIVED.—In reply to a question in the House of Commons Premier Lloyd George stated that the net amount of reparations money received from Germany was about \$500,000,000.

NEW ONTARIO LOAN.—Ontario took advantage of the strong demand for its treasury bills, as revealed in the quick sale of \$600,000,000 last week, and it became known that an additional \$4,000,000 was taken by the syndicate and subsequently sold, making \$10,000,000 in all. The same group of sixteen bond houses, known as the Ames Syndicate, acted in this instance and the terms were unchanged, that is to say, the province gets 99.53 and borrows its

money on a basis of 6.88 per cent. The treasury bills are for six months, and bear six per cent. The same quick absorption of the additional bills was experienced, as had been the case with the first issue, and the \$4,000,000 were cleaned up in a few hours. The bills being sold at par to yield six per cent.
