BASEBALL'S GREATEST FIGURE RETIRES FROM LIMELIGHT FOR YEAR

Weary of Constant Criticism of His Failure to Bring Pennant to Club—Will Devote Entire Time to Business Interests—Re- puted Wealthiest of Baseball Players —Is Succeeded by George Moriarity.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 4.—The ball player that ever lived. After 21 years of brilliant baseball the Georgian, weary of constant criticism for his failure to develop a pennant winning club, resigned today as manager of the Detroit Tigers.

George Moriarity, the American League umpire who made his baseball reputation as a third baseman for the Detroit team, will be the new manager. His selection was announced today by President Frank J. Navin.

Cobb left for his Augusta, Ga., home immediately after tendering his resignation. Friends said that Cobb will devote his entire time to varied business interests. He is generally reputed to be the wealthiest of the baseball players and will not don a uniform for at least a year.

Disension was often reported in the Detroit club. This player and that player were said to be unable to "get along" with Cobb. His handling of pitchers was objected to by many.

Outstanding Player

Cobb began his Tiger career in 1905. He has never played with any other major league club. The financial success of the Detroit Baseball Club, is intertwined with the days in which Cobb was baseball's greatest attraction. For many years he was such a box office magnet as Babe Ruth is today. It was his versatility as much as his batting that won him the designation of the "Greatest

Moriarity's Career

Moriarity broke into professional baseball in 1904, when he was picked up from the sand lots at Woodstock, Ill., by Frank Self, manager of the Chicago Cubs. After adventures in the minors Moriarity went to the New York Yankees with whom he played during 1906, 1907 and 1908. He was traded to the Tigers during the winter of 1908-09 and played under Hughie Jennings for the next seven years.

Moriarity was traded to the Chicago White Sox in 1916. Later he contracted typhoid fever and when he recovered he was appointed to the American League umpire staff.
