another manifestation of a fear of Radicalism, and a desire not to release a bird in the hand for several in the bush.

The Press generally draws an analogy between the American and British elections.

The belief was widely expressed that Americans are so prosperous that they need not enhance any change and that this precipitated the sweep toward Conservatism.

French opinion generally appears to be satisfied with the result, as it was practically neutral as between the Republicans and the Democrats, basing its neutrality on the only question "vitally interesting France—the war debts."

The Press has pointed out that neither Republicans nor Democrats held out hope that great concessions would be made in this regard.

Broadcasting From Moncton Tonight

(Special to Guardian) MONCTON, Nov. 6.—Friday night will be an eventful evening for radio, particularly for those in eastern Canada. The new Moncton broadcasting station of the Canadian National Railways to be known as C. N. R. A. will be officially opened by Vice-President W. D. Robb and a concert given by a company of high class artists including the famous C. N. R. Orpheus Quartette, Madame Pouget, Corbell Soprano, Miss Helen Langdon, Cellist; Mr. James McIntyre, Violinist; and Mr. R. L. Cordy, accompanist. Mr. Robb will be introduced by Mr. W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic Region, who will broadcast a message of welcome.

Sunshine and Fresh Air For Bad Girls

(Special to Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 6.—The English reformers' idea of making bad girls better is to give them trips to the seaside. Accordingly last year several of the detention institutions for young girls took parties of inmates to various seaside resorts, where they were given a two weeks vacation with only the supervision of two matrons to each party of 25 girls.

Last year's outline proved so successful that nearly all similar institutions this year took up the idea and allowed their best behaved girls to have a vacation. The expenses for the trip, above what it would have cost to feed and provide for the girls at the institution, were donated by persons interested in progressive and human methods in the correctional institutions of the country.
