ADDITIONAL LARGE CONTRACTS FOR WESTERN CANADA POWER COMPANY

Contracts for the supply of power by the Western Canada Power Company are continuing to be received at the Company's office in Vancouver. Advice has just been received, showing that to date 13,060 h. p. has been contracted for, of which amount at least 13,000 h. p. will be used as connected load this year. In addition to this large total a number of other big contracts aggregating 3,500 h. p. will be signed up within short time in fact a soon as the electrical connections can be made. On the above basis it is quite probable that by July 1st, the total amount of contracts signed up will be in excess of 20,000 h. p., so that by the end of the present year the estimated connected load of 30,000 h. p. will be an accomplished fact. It has been estimated that the net earnings of the Company based on supplying a connected load of 30,000 h. p. will be \$500,000, or over 2 1/2 times the interest on the total authorized bond issue of which only 75 per cent has been issued to date. The Royal Securities Corporation purchased recently by private sale an issue of 4 1/2 per cent 30-year debentures of the Town of Montreal amounting to \$60,000. This municipality is a growing residential suburb of the City of Quebec, and showing extensive improvements each year.

A SLUMP IN POTATOES AT ST. JOHN

ST. JOHN, March 16—Potatoes have taken quite a slump in the local market and it is now thought likely that prices will go still lower. On Thursday quite a lot of the tubers were placed on the produce market and the quotations fell away to 8 cents a bushel or \$2 a barrel. There seems to be quite a lot of potatoes left among the farmers and there is every likelihood that these will unload soon. Potatoes were very high and were recently sold as high as \$3 a barrel. There is a story of one farmer who had about 200 bushels on hand who refused to sell at that figure under the impression that they would go to \$4 a barrel. Butcher keeps scarce and high for the season of the year, good roll butter selling for about 35 cents a pound.

OF INTEREST TO FARMERS.

The Seed Fairs are over now for this spring and the educational meetings have given our farmers plenty of food for thought. It should not however end there. This thought should result in large field crops, better dairy cattle and generally in a more prosperous agriculture. To begin with, a better quality of seed should be sown this spring than ever was sown before and the ground should be better prepared. Those who intend to enter in the Fields of Standing Grain Competitions should make preparations at once. 50 acres are required for oats, 3 for wheat and 2 for barley. Full particulars can be had from the Department of Agriculture.

Too many varieties of oats are grown in this Province. It would be well if whole districts would grow only one variety. There would then be less danger of their being mixed with other varieties and any seed-house wanting a carload or several carloads of any one variety could then get it without difficulty. Of course difficulty might arise about the choice of that variety. The Banner is however best known in the markets of Eastern Canada. At any rate it is more frequently asked for than all the other varieties combined. It is an oat too of fair quality. It grows somewhat tall, but the hull is not thick and the proportion of secondary kernels is small and the reports of the Experimental Farms

show that on an average it is a heavier producer than any other variety. A glance at the prize lists of the two Provincial Fairs, which have not been held would indicate that the Belques, St. Eleonors and Lot '6 are now producing Banner oats of the very best quality. Would it not be well for the Institutes in these sections to make a canvass of their members and of all others whom they can influence and try to have no oats but Banner sown in these sections this spring. If the idea is a good one now is the time to make the start.

Provincials have heard for the last two or three years that the reason apple buyers did not come to this Province was that not enough of one variety was grown. It is now said that the leading seedsmen cannot get a sufficient quantity of the first quality of oats of one variety at one time to induce them to look for their supplies here. Farmers should soon be able to remedy this. Why should not the farmers in the vicinity of any of the more important shipping points be in a position to apply one or more carloads of the highest quality of seed oats? They could do it without difficulty if each man took care to begin with pure seed and sowed only one variety. Would it not be worth some section giving it a trial?

A STORY WITHIN A STORY.

A. Wylie Mahon, a writer in The Canadian Magazine, gives some account of the original of the Rev. Mr. Scott of L. M. Montgomery's "The Story Girl." He says that this character actually lived in the person of Rev. John Sprott, one of the house missionary pioneers of the Maritime Provinces, of whom he tells the following story, as given by an "old-timer":
