OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 17.—(Eggs) The egg market situation in the east is very unsettled with the Chicago spot prices again lower today.

Toronto: This market is uneasy. Buying prices are unchanged with dealers quoting for ungraded eggs extras 43 to 44; firsts, 35 to 41; seconds 32. Eggs purchased in Chicago at today's price of 27 would cost, delivered here, 39. Prices to retailers are slightly lower with dealers quoting extras 49; firsts 46; seconds 42.

Montreal: The egg market is in full supply and easier. States storage are jobbing at 37 to 38. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 46 to 47; firsts, 42 to 43; seconds 38 to 39.

Winnipeg: Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 48; firsts 46; seconds 35. Prices to retailers extras 53; firsts 51; seconds 45.

Saskatoon: Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 42 to 44; firsts 38 to 4; seconds 32 to 34.

Miller's Three Goal Win in College Battle

SACKVILLE, Feb. 17.—Mount Allison won the Western Section of the Intercollegiate League and the right to play off with St. Francis Xavier for the Maritime Intercollegiate championship when they defeated the University of New Brunswick here tonight by a score of 3 to 1.

Mount Allison completely outplayed U.N.B. from start to finish and their back checking and poke checking broke up U.N.B.'s attack after time. Hickson and Bartlett, opposing goalies both played brilliantly and made many wonderful stops.

Bartlett, who is a former Halifax County Academy boy, has only allowed two goals to get past him this season. The outstanding player on the ice, however, was Bill Miller, Mount Allison forward, who scored all three of Mount Allison's goals and who played brilliantly throughout the game.

Mount Allison were strengthened by having Bill McLennan back on their defense after having a week's rest. This is the first time since 1922 that Mount Allison has won the Western Section.

In the first period Mount Allison started away fast and made many assaults on the U.N.B. goal, only to be turned back by Hickson. The play was fast and furious, but neither team could get past the goalies for a score and the period ended U.N.B. 0, M.A. 0.

IN MEMORIAM

DR. C. J. BOUSFIELD
The following particulars have been received of the death of the late Dr. C. J. Bousfield whose sudden death was reported yesterday.

The Doctor had been around as usual Wednesday, and had been out during the evening, and passed away shortly after entering the house.

For the past two or three years he had been suffering from high blood pressure, but as his condition was not believed to be alarming, the news that he has been suddenly called away comes as a deep shock to his many friends in the city.

He was born in the north of England, in the Lake country, sixty years ago, and has been a resident of Canada for many years, first practicing his profession near Hamilton, Ontario and doing inspection work for the Federal Government. He came to Prince Edward Island about ten or twelve years ago, and since then has been Federal Government Inspector under the Health of Animals Branch, Department of Agriculture, at Davids and Fraser's plant.

He was faithful, capable and conscientious in the discharge of his duties, was a man of splendid character, genial and friendly in his manner, and in every way a most estimable citizen.

Two or three years ago he built a residence at the head of Upper Prince Street. He was an enthusiastic gardener, a great lover of flowers, and took a keen delight in beautifying the surroundings of his home.

He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow who is also a native of England. Among his other surviving relatives is a sister in England whom he visited last fall and the preceding fall when he made trips to the Old Country in connection with shipments of cattle. There is also one brother in Woburn, Mass.

Dr. Bousfield was a member, a regular attendant, and former Vestryman of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in this city.

The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon, services commencing at the church at 2.30.

The widow and other relatives will have the sincere sympathy of a wide circle of friends here in their sudden bereavement.
