THE CITY WHARVES.

The City that is the entire body of our citizens, owns two of the wharves on the water front, Queen's and Pownall wharves. It is therefore in the interest of every citizen that these wharf properties shall have railway connection. The extension of the railway track as asked for along the water front would increase the value of the city property as well as of private properties, the latter paying taxes, and would thus increase the civic revenues. On the other hand the policy of diverting as far as possible all the trade of the port to one Government Railway wharf would injure, if not destroy the value of the civic and private wharf properties west of George Street. These properties cost money and yield taxes. Why should they be rendered useless and the wharf revenues turned over to the rich Dominion Government? Surely these are points worth considering.

Shall the City exit its Home?

Civic elections on the 10th February and the federal by-election six days later on the 16th together with the necessary canvassing will keep the politicians busy for three weeks to come.
