SEVEN MURDERERS DIE

OSSING, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Seven murderers were taken from the cells in Sing Sing this morning and put to death in the electric chair. This is the largest number of criminals to suffer the death penalty by electricity on any one day since the electric chair was adopted as a method of capital punishment. The six Italians and one negro electrocuted this morning went to their deaths quietly, and the executions were accomplished within an hour and seven minutes. The condemned men were put to death in the following order: John W. Collins, Lorenzo L. Cali, Salvatore De Marco, Pilepo De Marco, Angelo Giustino, Vincenzo Cona and Joseph Ferrone.

The prison guards expected that Ferrone might put up a fight on his way to the execution chamber, but he walked meekly to the chair. "Cona fainted as the straps were being adjusted about his body. He walked to the chair white faced and trembling, and as he kissed the crucifix was affixed quickly and the current ran when the leather straps were being placed about his body, he fell over limply in a dead faint. The cap sent through his body. All the prisoners with the exception of Collins, walked into the death chamber protesting their innocence. Collins came in smiling and seemingly happy, and did not deny his guilt. He prayed on his knees at the chair for a minute before he was executed.

Accordingly he was sent back by the evening train and was taken to the Halifax Infirmary, where an operation was performed by Dr. N. E. Mackay. It was a pretty bad case, but the surgeon is quite hopeful of recovery, anticipating that the patient will be able to leave the infirmary in a couple of weeks. A bulletin from the infirmary at midnight was that Mr. Mackinnon pected.

A POISONING CASE.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 12.—Mrs. In the June issue of The Monthly Child and Medical Bulletin of Philadelphia, edited by Charles E. de M. J. de M., M. D., L. D., appears the following: "Many physicians have come to realize that caffeine, as daily consumed in coffee and tea, has much to do with the causation of many annoying ailments that formerly were obscurely diagnosed and vaguely treated. It stands to reason, that this alkaloid, when taken in daily doses of six or more grains, must exert a harmful action on the nervous, circulatory, and digestive systems. Its action may also modify the action of other drugs prescribed by the physicians." Continuing this article says: "Postum, the well known cereal beverage, made of clean hard wheat and a small percentage of molasses, has been the means of effecting an easy change from coffee and its harmful stimulant-caffeine—to a wholesome, enlivening, nourishing beverage. eminent analysts such as Prof. J. V. Mallet of the University of Virginia have proven that a cup of coffee (only three-fifths coffee and the rest milk) contains about 2 1/2 grains of caffeine. A Government report issued April 13, 1912, from the Bureau of Chemistry shows that the deadly coffee drug, caffeine, administered in small doses, caused the death of rats, hogs, rabbits and guinea pigs in a few hours.

Frieda Trost, proprietress of an uptown saloon, who was arrested yesterday on a charge of having caused the death of her husband, William Trost, within a week after her marriage to him by administering poison, was committed to prison for her appearance tomorrow, when an inquest will be started in the case. Edmond Guenkle, bartender for Mrs. Trost, was also committed as a material witness in the case, which the police say will have sensational developments. After the arrest of the woman, the police say they found a

druggist from whom she purchased poison on Monday, or shortly before her husband was taken ill. At the hearing today the coroner's detective testified that in his investigation of the Trosts he learned that Mrs. Trost, who was a widow when she married a second time, was deeply in debt. An autopsy performed by a coroner's physician, the detective said, showed that Trost's death was caused by poison. The police said that Trost had a bank account of \$4,000 and that his life was insured for \$2,000.
