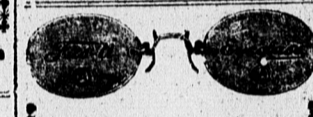

going, paying the rent for the and buying new books and magazines. 5672 books were taken out from the Library during the year. To encourage the young people to read books, other than fiction, prizes were offered for the best essays written on the Life of Robert L. Stevenson, Joan of Arc, Cyrus McMillan's Wonder Tales, the Earth and other subjects. 1st prize of \$5.00 was awarded to Adrienne G. Perry, her essay being on Joan of Arc. Second prize of \$3.50 was awarded to Gertrude Rice on the Life of Robert L. Stevenson. 3rd prize of \$2.00 to Helen McQuarrie on the Life of R. L. Stevenson.

Prizes of patriotic pictures were also awarded to two of the Grades in the School. One for the best essay on "Summerside" won for the Room by Eleanor Rice. The other was awarded to Marion MacArthur for her Grade. The essays were written on King George the 5th. Two other pictures were presented to the school, Canada's answer and the story of "The Flag".

We held one home cooking sale and one concert in aid of the Library Fund.
