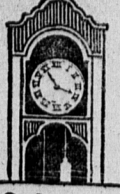

WINNIPEG FUR SALES.—An
association, with the backing of
several of the largest fur trading
posts in the northwest has been
formed here by local business men,
who hope to make Winnipeg the
centre of fur trading for the west-
ern world. H. Newdall, who for the
past 16 years has been identified
with every phase of the Canadian
fur business, is the manager of
the new company, and is well
known by fur shippers. The first
sale will take place the first week
in March. A special feature of the
sale will be the system of bidding
by sealed tenders instead of the
method of open bidding. By this
procedure, it is claimed, buyers
and seller alike will have the as-
surance that they have been fairly
treated. Any shipper may place a
reserve bid on his consignment.

CHILDREN BADLY FED.—A re-
port just issued by the board of ed-
ucation contains a statement by
Chief Inspector Cowley to the ef-
fect that there are 19,000 under-
nourished children attending public
schools in Toronto. This is based
on a survey of certain schools and
develops the remarkable fact that
one school, situated in one of the
wealthiest districts in the city, had
15 per cent of its pupils in the ill-
nourished class as compared with
14 per cent in a downtown school—
the best record of any of the
schools included in the survey.
"THIS goes to show that it is not
altogether the quantity of food, but
the quality of it that counts," com-
mented the chief inspector.

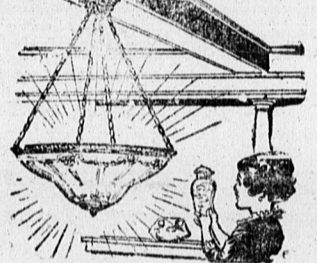

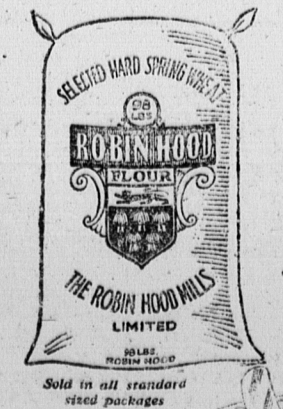
