**POTATO FLEET AT PICTOU**—The Advocate says:—There was a fleet of sixteen sail or more of Island schooners in port this week, all loaded down with potatoes for shipment, for the most part, to Upper Canada. The schooners were crowded into the railway dock in order to unload their cargoes into cars. There is a scarcity of cars and many of the freight trains bound to Upper Canada have not been moving very fast, with the result that there are said to have been thousands of bushels of "spuds" frozen during the recent cold snap. A Montreal paper reports that the dealers there allowed the potatoes to remain in cars and be frozen, while they paid demurrage sooner than have them go on the market and break the price. We hear that most of the potatoes were bought for Montreal or wherever they were to be delivered. In that case the shipper at this end would suffer the loss. It seems a pity that in a year when food products are needed so badly, there should be such heavy losses.

**OVER 4,000 MEN IN SOLDIERS' HOMES**

Controlled by Canada's Military Hospital Commission.

**OTTAWA, Nov. 25.**—There are 4,708 convalescent soldiers in the various homes throughout Canada under the control of the military hospital commission, of these 58 have not been overseas. Besides these there are 907 out-patients, 320 overseas men in sanitariums, and 232 others. The number will be increased greatly in the immediate future, as it has been decided to relieve as much as possible the congestion of wounded in England. About 4,000 men who have been assigned to base duty in England, will also be brought back. It is felt that they could more readily get work now than after the war. The Canadian wounded overseas are being looked after by three organizations, the Casualty Assembly Center, the Canadian Command Depot and the Canadian Discharge Depot.
