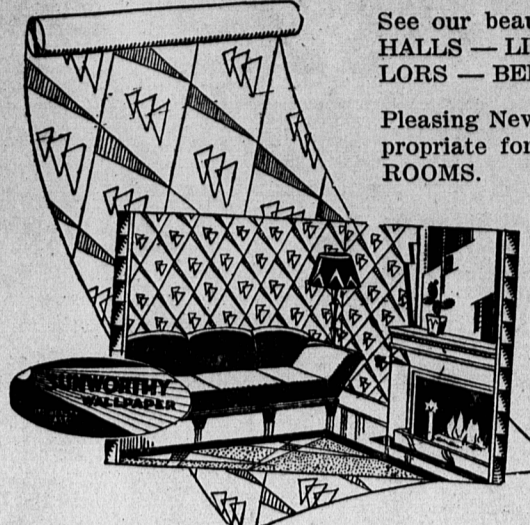
N. B. Budget Debate Is Nearing End

MAN SENTENCED FOR ENLISTING IN WRONG ARMY

PARIS, France, March 22. — A Frenchman who fought with the Canadian infantry in the war has been sentenced to a year in prison for not having responded to his country's call to arms. On the outbreak of war Jean

Ernest Boissanade left his work in Detroit to join the Canadians and served with them for three years.

He has just returned to France from the United States, to learn that there was an old warrant out against him for failing to report for duty in time of war.

Boissanade pleaded to the Military Tribunal of Paris that his mobilization papers reached his former address in Detroit, Michigan, when he was actually in the trenches with the Canadians.

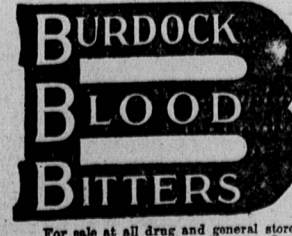
