MR. HUGH MCINNIS,
Before leaving the Island for Halifax, we the newspaper men of Charlottetown, ask you to accept this token of our regard. As a newspaper man your work was characterized by fidelity, efficiency and that alertness inseparable from the life of a journalist. As a citizen your walk, conversation and character have been such as mark the upright man and the builder of society. Entering the fourth estate as an apprentice, step by step you achieved promotion until you were as clever with the pen as with the stick. Your elevation to a wider field proves that "worth makes the man." This has been your record. This is our farewell. It is a matter of sincere regret that Mr. Fred. Morris had to give his most excellent recital of piano music to such a small audience as that which assembled in the Kindergarten Hall last night. No doubt the strong claims of the counter attractions prevented many from being present who would otherwise have enjoyed the rich fare presented by the most talented pianist who has ever performed in Charlottetown. An excellent program had been prepared, the band, twenty-five strong were on their best musical behaviour, and, recognizing they were in a building the brass was nicely toned down the reads stood out well, the band played tastefully and merited the encomium of a bystander "They never played better." Especial mention should be made of the waltz "Mignola" and the selections "Frollo of the Imps" the vocal chorus in this being better musically than morally as it intimates the imps after their realistic frolic in which groans, chains, pistol shots harrow one's feelings—the imps vociferously intimate they will return to a place which rhymes with ladies. The views given by Mr. Hassard were explained by Chaplain Fullerton. Brief and to the point, comments and lessons deduced were tersely yet none the less forcefully given. The Band merits a good house. Charlottetown is loyal to its own and a good audience in point of numbers and who were generous of their applause was present.
