SUPREME COURT.—The Trinity Term of the Supreme Court opens in Charlottetown at 11 o'clock this forenoon. The new Chief Justice Hon. J. A. Matheson will be sworn into office before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. There will be two criminal cases on the docket. James Henry Weeks for larceny of flour from J. A. Farquharson, and John M. Stewart for receiving the flour knowing it to have been stolen.

GOOD PROFIT ON P. E. ISLAND SPUDS.—Says the Halifax Chronicle A fine, able-looking craft is the top-sail schooner Forbin, which arrived in port on Thursday from Gloucester. The Forbin will load salt at Smith's wharf for St. Jacques and Belloram, Nfld., and then will load dry fish at those places for Gloucester. Four years ago the Forbin was built at St. Malo, France. Two years ago she came to Canada and was wrecked on the Gaspe Coast. She was sold to Quebec parties and traded on the St. Lawrence. Late last autumn she sailed from Charlottetown for Gloucester with a cargo of potatoes. She was three months on the voyage, having been caught in the ice. When she arrived at Gloucester some of her potatoes were spoiled but the price of potatoes had then so greatly advanced that despite the heavy expenses of a voyage of such lengthy duration, a good profit was made on the cargo. At Gloucester the vessel laid up for the rest of the winter and this spring was bought by Boston and Salem parties. Captain Pothier, master of the vessel, has an interest in her. She is fitted with all modern labor-saving devices including an engine for hoisting the anchor and sails.

SOLDIERS' DIET


The food of soldiers engaged in the war varies according to their nationalities. The principal meal of the Russian soldier consists of stotch, something between a gruel and a soup, the chief ingredients of which are cabbage, potatoes, oatmeal and fat meat—preferably pork. These are boiled together, with salt and other seasoning, the result being a thick, nourishing and by no means unpalatable dish.

The Italian soldiers, who are splendid marchers, live largely on a farinaceous diet—macaroni, spaghetti, and so on. They are also very partial to fruit, which is issued, together with wine and cigars, as part of their rations whenever possible.

No German soldier considers his daily menu complete without a sausage of some kind or other, and the "stronger" its flavor the better. A nutritious pea soup is also a staple of the army ration.

The mainstay of the French soldier consists of his beloved "soup," as he calls it. It is really a thick nourishing stew, made of meat, potatoes and various other vegetables.

The English "Tommy" may be described as omnivorous.
