THE CASE OF THE TUNNEL.

The Tunnel question must not be allowed to sleep, and we are glad to learn that it will presently be brought before Parliament for discussion. The mere fact that during a winter of unprecedented mildness the winter steamers have been running between Georgetown and Picton with only occasional interruptions must not be permitted to stave off the Tunnel question. Nothing could be more deceptive than to rely upon a repetition of present conditions for the future. Not in many years past have we had such a winter as the present and the like may not occur again for a generation to come.

But even if we were assured that all the winters to come would be as mild as the present winter has so far proved the case for the Tunnel be still overwhelmingly strong. The advantage of a direct, all-rail system connecting the centre of the Island and the Mainland, as compared with the present circuitous and intermittent connection by boat at one end of the Island would be enormous. The saving in time, in distance and cost in travel and transportation, the removal of uncertainty, the saving of transhipments, the increased revenue to the Island Railway and the Intercolonial the saving in cost of maintaining and operating winter steamers would obviously run up to hundreds of thousands of dollars yearly.

The strength of our case for the Tunnel rests upon the threefold foundation of impregnable justice and fact:

(1) The undoubted right of our people to equal facilities of transportation at equal rates with the people of the other Provinces.

(2) The treaty obligation of Canada to give us constant and efficient communication by steam with the Mainland.

(3) The demonstrated and undisputed fact that this can be done by the construction and operation of a railway Tunnel without a dollar in addition to the cost of the present and prospective connection by winter steamers, having in view what the Tunnel would save and what it would earn.

There remains the fact that the proposed Tunnel is not a local, but a national work, that would be of almost equal value and importance to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia as to Prince Edward Island, a national necessity to complete the physical union of the Provinces and the only solid guarantee against possible future dismemberment. As a maritime work, the expenditure of ten millions for such an object is ten times over warranted as a decent balancing for the enormous expenditure for transportation works in the west. And the East will yet call in every imperative fashion for a restoration of the financial balance.

Furthermore, we submit to our reasonable friends in the west, whether they think it will be possible long to continue a condition of things in which one Province of Canada shall have but one outward and but one inward mail daily, in which it is only possible for passengers to leave the Province in the morning and only possible to return in the evening, even when all the channels of communication are open and working at their best. In a

score of ways the long continuance of present conditions would be impossible, even if all our winters were to be as mild as the present. The Tunnel must be built. If the present Government will not face the problem, loss and a big bill for damages must follow and a succeeding Government must take it up. Our right to the Tunnel is irresistible and must be met.

FOR CLEAN ELECTIONS.

In six counties of New Brunswick the opposing candidates stand pledged to conduct the coming elections without the use of money or liquor. These are St. John, Kings, Charlotte Westmorland, York and Carleton. Together these counties will return twenty-four members to the new Legislature, a majority of the whole House. It is hoped that the candidates in other counties, notably the well-known temperance counties of Albert, Sanbury and Queens will yet be added to the list. This is something unexampled in the history of elections in any Province of Canada.

The movement is a notable one and one much needed. The corrupt use of money and intoxicants in election has been a disgrace to our Canadian civilization. Regrettably this has been true even of our own Prohibition Province. We invite our clergyman to join with the press, as has been done in New Brunswick to make an organized effort to suppress this great evil. It can be done; it must be done. Candidates will in most cases at least be willing to forego these disgraceful practices if they can have a reasonable assurance that their opponents will do the same. This course would greatly reduce the cost of elections while conducting to order and decency in the exercise of the priceless privilege of choosing the men who are to make our laws and carry on the Government.

It is gratifying to learn that 30,000 bushels at least of Island seed oats will go to the Northwest, that quantity being contracted for with Joseph Read & Co. of Summerside. We hope to learn of still other contracts. Good results ought to follow the change of seed from our Island soil to the distant prairie country.

The prisoner E.O. Brown, adjudged to be insane by the jury empaneled to try him, was yesterday afternoon sent to the Hospital for Insane. There are many who think this action should have been taken at once after the jury's verdict, as in such cases the early application of skilled treatment and care affords the best and often the only chance of recovery.

Why the Examiner's ill-natured reference to Hon. H. J. Palmer as Attorney General? We know of no good reason why the office should not be given him, or why he should not accept it. Even The Examiner does not affirm that in his official capacity he has yet done anything wrong or omitted any duty. Fair play demands that an official shall be judged by his acts.

Three years hence the census of Canada will be taken. What will the total then be? Every past census proved in a measure disappointing. The gain between 1871 and 1881 was in round figures 655,000; between 1881 and 1891 it was 498,000, and at last census 548,000. There was a five years boom before the census of 1901 and yet the gain during the census period was less than it had been twenty years before.

The Patriot commends the old age annuity system proposed by the Government as "a new departure." It is new in Canada only as a Government undertaking. The insurance companies have been selling annuities from time out of mind. Citizens here in Charlottetown are in receipt of such annuities, and we have yet to learn that the Government plan will be any more favorable to the purchaser than that already in practice by the companies. If so, where is the gain to anybody? As we understand it the Government plan contemplates nothing better than that the annuitant shall get his own money back with simple interest at 4 per cent.
