They state that they shipped car loads as far West as Owen Sound this year, and five car loads into Quebec City, and conclude the letter by saying that they could have sold fifty thousand bushels in the Province of Quebec if they had had them ready in time. There is no doubt at all that Prince Edward Island is destined to become the basis of supply for Pure Seeds for Eastern Canada. Seed Fairs and Competitions in Fields of Standing Grain are both helping to bring this about, and every farmer would do well to enter in the Standing Fields of Grain Competitions this year. The number of prizes offered by the Department of Agriculture for fields of oats has been doubled this year, and everything is being done that can be done to assist in this work. If farmers are raising pure grain of good quality they should enter this Competition even if they do not win a prize. The reports are printed and sent broadcast throughout Eastern Canada, and every year more merchants and farmers are taking advantage of this Report when considering the purchasing of their seed grain. Anyone who is not already quite familiar with these Competitions should write the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, P. E. I.
