WESTERN SYSTEM OF GRAIN MARKETING

To be Adopted by the Grain Growers of Ontario - Advantages of New Method.

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, June 18.—The United Farmers Cooperative Company decided today to establish the wheat pool system of grain marketing in Ontario following the lead of the western provinces.

Contracts will be entered into by the farmers to deliver their grain only to the pool which will then feed the market in accordance with the best marketing practice.

Under the Western system the farmer receives a percentage of the price of his grain on delivery later payments being made when the price is pooled.

CHICAGO BOUND TRAINS LOADED TO CAPACITY

Many Special Trains Required to Handle Last Minute Rush of Traffic to the Eucharistic Congress.
