Rev. Mr. Coleman is a native of St. John and studied for the ministry at Wycliffe College and Toronto University.

He was ordained as Deacon in St. Alban's Cathedral, Toronto, in 1926 and in 1927 he was ordained to the priesthood at All Saints Cathedral, Halifax, N. S. He came as a Deacon to the Port Hill parish, which includes St. James Church, Port Hill, St. Peter's, Lot 11, and St. John's at Ellerslie. These churches although small have often been spoken of as the prettiest country churches in Canada.

The people of the Port Hill parish deeply regret the departure of Rev. Mr. Coleman from their midst and besides the public addresses of farewell, the rector received many letters of regret accompanied by goodwill for the future from his parishioners and others outside the parish.

Rev. Mr. Coleman is very highly esteemed by the clergy of the diocese and has served on various committees on the D.C.S. during his journey on the Island. He was of the Chapter of the Masonic Lodge (Alexander No. 5) at Port Hill and the Grand Chaplain of the Island Lodges. At the last regular meeting of the Lodge at Port Hill expressions of regret were voiced that Rev. Mr. Coleman was leaving. Past Deputy Grand Master W. J. Montgomery on behalf of the Lodge and also of the community tendered him a farewell, speaking in the highest terms of his work in the community.

On Sunday last Rev. Mr. Coleman preached his farewell sermon and held his Christmas services. At St. Peter's Church, Lot 11, at the close of the farewell service, Mr. Robert H. Palmer read an address from the parishioners and presented Rev. Mr. Coleman with a well filled purse. At St. John's Ellerslie, an address was read by Mr. R. L. Williams on behalf of the congregation, who also presented the rector with a purse of money.

In each instance the Reverend gentleman replied to the addresses with deep feeling saying that he would always look upon his ministry in Port Hill parish as work of real pleasure, bringing such happiness and contentment that does not often fall to the lot of a country clergyman. With his bride he had been given a very hearty welcome by the people of the parish and although he was going to a larger field of labour he and his family would have very happy recollections of Ernest Edward Ellerslie and particularly Port Hill, Ellerslie and Lot 11, the districts where he had first laboured for the church.

On Wednesday, December 12th, the congregation of St. James Church, Port Hill, met at the home of Mrs. Annie Maynard and had a very enjoyable social evening to bid farewell to their beloved pastor and

long the southwestern coast of Nova Scotia. Snow, rain and wind tonight combined to do further damage to wharves, boats and fishing gear. All during the storm fishermen were forced to stand helplessly by and watch their lobster traps tossed up and smashed on the rock-bound coast.

At Clark's Harbor three small wharves were battered away and with the loss of extensive fishing gear it was estimated damage would amount to several hundred or perhaps thousands of dollars.
