THE case of Jenkins vs Berrigan and Locke on the charge of "procuring liquor for certain persons came up yesterday for hearing before Stipendiary McDonald. Cases against those two men had been dismissed a week ago on the ground that the summonses did not state for whom the liquor was procured. The Magistrate had granted the usual statutory certificates of dismissal for the forming cases and these certificates were yesterday put in evidence. It was contended for the defence that those certificates were a complete bar under the Summary Convictions Act to the cases under adjudication as being for the same offences. It was contended that as the summonses were for "procuring liquor" for the witnesses it should be proved that it had been procured on some street, lane or by-way and that it could not be contended that liquor was sold in such places. The witnesses swore they did not know where the liquor had been procured. Judgment was reserved for a week. E. O. Brown for both defendants.

HIS HONOR the Lieutenant Governor entertained a number of Members of the Legislature, officials and citizens at dinner at Government House last evening.

THERE was no lack of excitement at the basket ball games at the Y. M. C. A. last evening. Both games were replete with sensational plays. The first game was between the teachers and the store clerks, the former showed themselves too strong for their opponents and defeated them by a score of 10-4. The playing was by no means one-sided. In the second half Os. Wright made a very pretty goal which was not allowed on account of being scored after dribbling the ball. This victory for the teachers brings them up to tie for first place with the store clerks. The second game was between the P. W. C. and the business men. The teams were evenly matched and at no time did either team have a safe lead. Walter Prowse scored two very pretty goals from the center of the floor. Though the P. W. C. have played a number of close games this is the first they have won.
