Armstrong, minister of the Summerside Church, in behalf of the church in a short address of welcome extended to the delegates - hearty welcome.

organization, in order to ensure the greatest possible success in evangelization.

The second address, the need of consecrated preachers who would proclaim the Divine message. The speaker also pointed out the need of a large liberality on the part of the entire church.

The third address emphasized the need of prayer as one of the first essentials in all religious efforts. Unity of effort was also strongly urged in the work of evangelism.

Saturday afternoon's session was devoted to women, the women having charge of this session. Mrs. Maynard Schurman was chairman of this meeting. The Auxiliary of the Christian Woman's Board of Missions gave a very encouraging report of work done during the past year. Advance steps were also taken for the work of the ensuing year.

The Auxiliary also plans to support a worker on the foreign field. Saturday evening's session dealt with the subject "The Working Church." H. R. Bell spoke of a working church's financial standpoint. The speaker pointed out the liberality of the people under the old covenant, and maintained that under the new covenant no Christian should give less than one-tenth of his or her income to the Lord. Before men and women would be prompted to give as they should, they must first give themselves to the Lord. The speaker also said all we have, properly belongs to God, and that everything should be used to the glory of God.

C. E. Armstrong spoke on the social side of Church life. The thoughts advanced were that the Church must adapt herself to present social conditions. Harmless amusements, especially for the young of the Church were advocated in order to bring them in touch with the Church after which they should be encouraged to enter into full responsibilities of a Christian life.

John Lord addressed the convention on "The Relation of the Elders to the Church." It was shown that the Eldership was the instructory and directory force of the Church. The Elders are to be careful and teach by example and precept. The speaker also thought that a successful Church depends very largely upon the efficiency of the Church.

Sunday morning Rev. J. F. Floyd of Charlottetown preached the Convention Sermon. H. R. Bell preached at 3 p.m., subject "Isaiah, a type of Christ," and at the evening service John Lord preached from John, 8:32, subject "The Truth That Sets Free." Monday was entirely devoted to Church business. Convention closed same night.

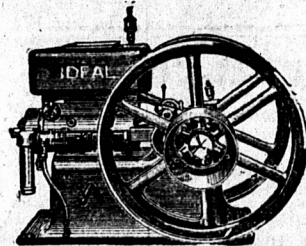
