Has Suspended Forty Policemen
 PHILADELPHIA, May 20.—A secret investigation by a special squad of police, known as the "corporals," has revealed a conspiracy between a number of Philadelphia brewery owners and about 400 patrolmen, detailed to prevent the breweries from violating the prohibition law.
 Director of Public Safety Butler so declared today after his suspension of forty patrolmen charged with accepting bribes from brewers and in aiding brewery employees in loading illegal beer on trucks for delivery to saloons.

 The total number of eggs laid for the week was 905, and the total to date is 17,758. This was 96 eggs more than was laid the same week last year, and 1325 more than at the same date last year.
 Mr. W. G. MacDonald's Barred Rocks were first for the week with 58 eggs. Mr. Spurgeon Jenkin's led with Mr. Joseph Carmichael's Barred Rocks, for second place with 55 eggs each. Mr. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns were third with 53. Mr. Charles Parker's Barred Rocks were fourth with 51. Mr. W. G. MacDonald's Barred Rocks were fifth, with 50. Mr. Harry Lyde's Barred Rocks are sixth with 49. Mr. G. W. Connor's White
