SAYS AUTUMN MAY STILL SEE GREAT MANOEUVRE BATTLE

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Times correspondent with the British Headquarters in France, reports that the torrential rains and cold biting winds on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, March-like weather, were unfortunate for both sides; but especially for the attackers, because they prevented reconnaissances, made all aircraft work difficult, depressed the men and interfered with the artillery observation work, while the spongy earth lessened the effect of the shell fire. Regarding the German defence, the correspondent says:

"Some people talk as if there existed an endless series of German positions stretching right away to the Rhine. This, of course, is unbelievable. We are ignorant of their number, but it may be said that it is strictly limited since fortified positions are not the work of a magician's wand but of arduous labor.

"The enemy is suffering heavily in guns and men, and even if he gets plenty of reinforcements, he is suffering a strain of the most harassing kind of the war and his resistance power weakens, with the loss of each fresh position.

"If men and munitions are forthcoming to the Allies, the Autumn may still see the manoeuvre battle, on a grand scale for which the world has been waiting."


