**Quarterly Meeting Of Grand Division Sons of Temperance**

The Grand Division met in session Jan. 23rd, at Fredericton, the guests of Refuge Division. There was a good representation from the various subordinate divisions throughout the Province.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch, Bro. G. Emerson Huestis, presided in a very capable manner. The regular business was dealt with in the usual manner. Two new members were initiated as members of the Grand Division, namely, Sister, Winifred Cutcliffe and Bro. Marshall Matheson.

Owing to the unavoidable absence of the Grand Scribe no report was given from that office.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch gave a very encouraging report as follows:

**REPORT OF THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH FOR QUARTER ENDING DEC. 31, 1929.**

Another quarter has passed and we have entered upon another year, forgetting our discouragements and trials of the past, and looking into the future with renewed hope and interest; with new tasks before us, and I hope, with our confidence in the all powerful God, who alone is able to make our Cause successful. As we face the new year may our courage be unshaken and our purpose remain firm, ever keeping in mind that he is thrice armed who hath his quarrel just. Confidently we feel that our Cause is just, although the forces arrayed against us would appear to have the majority at present. However let us never forget that we have a leader who has never known defeat; who has never led a single battle, and who has innumerable companies of angels ever ready to do His bidding. Therefore, I say at the opening of another year, let us take fresh courage and go forward undaunted, with faith supreme.

In looking back over the past quarter not much has been accomplished in the way of expansion. The quarter just past is the busiest one of the year and this has militated against us to a certain extent. Considerable correspondence has been done with various communities with a view of organization, and we believe that before the present quarter is out we shall see branches of our order in several other parts of our Province, among them O'Leary, Elmsdale, Montague, Carleton, and possibly others. Your G. W. P. expects to visit these places in the near future. There may be other places that we know; if so the next three months should prove very beneficial to our order.

It behooves every member of our Order to be right on the job as this should not be a work only for the G. W. P. and G. Scribe, but every member should be vitally interested and on fire for the success of each subordinate division. I often wonder why we are so lukewarm with our Temperance feelings as if we were afraid of ourselves. Let us remember that the greatest work in the world was started by one man, and a few humble followers. Again I say, take courage.

Further: While our Order at present comprises some 400 or 500 members we are a unit of a large band of devoted Temperance workers, many of them perhaps a silent partner in the business. This should serve to stimulate us to greater efforts and to inspire us to face the gigantic tasks confronting us. Let us not belittle the enemy. Their forces are also powerful, and resources almost unlimited. But we are in the right; of this there is no doubt, for we are fighting an evil, and working to banish a curse, the greatest with which the human race was ever afflicted. What are our weapons; a trust in a God that is all powerful, and who will eventually give us a triumph over our enemies.

A word to the members of each Subordinate Division; and especially to each Deputy. The working of our local Divisions should be carried on in as efficient a manner as possible. The Ritual should not be a ceremony to run over in a flippancy manner, but conducted with a reverent and careful method, just the same as if the matter was our own personal business and it is if we are thoroughly in earnest about our work in each Division. We should have an hour for starting our meetings and the members should make it a point to be present on time. Nothing does so much harm as opening our Divisions at any old hour. Our meetings should be conducted with the utmost decorum, keeping the motto of our order ever before us. Love, Purity and Fidelity. I believe we are sometimes lax in this respect. If so let each member make it their business to remedy the evil. How shall we expand our order if our ceremonies are carried on in an impro-

per manner and our Ritual made light of. This is a matter for each individual member to think of. A word to the wise is sufficient.

Some objectives and recommendations for the year 1930.

I. Every Subordinate Division on fire with enthusiasm for our cause, and endeavoring to double their present membership. This only means that each member get one new member. Not a very hard task.

II. That we as members do what we can in other communities to open up new branches of our Divisions, and pass the word along to those in charge of this work.

III. That we have a Forward Movement Fund, requesting each Division to contribute to same, fund for this purpose being raised as they see fit. These funds to be used for Propagation work in our Province.

IV. That we recommend to the various Divisions a budget for 1930 as follows:

This fund to be used for travelling expenses, Salary, Temperance, literature, organizing new Divisions, holding Temperance Meetings, etc.

V. That we make our evening meetings as attractive as possible, so that our members will be interested and held together more solidly. In this connection Divisions close to each other hold visits with each other and that the Deputies report once in a while to the Grand Worthy Patriarch or Grand Scribe how their respective Society is doing.

**REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE**

No. 1. Resolved that we extend our thanks to the members of Refuge Division and the people of Fredericton for their very generous hospitality in entertaining this quarterly session of the Grand Division.

No. 2. Resolved that we consider the present penalties for infractions against the Prohibitory Law entirely inadequate to curb the present large illicit liquor selling and smuggling; that fines from one to five hundred dollars do not mean anything in comparison to the huge profits made by the rum sellers.

No. 3. Resolved that we as a Grand Division assert our allegiance to the present Temperance legislation in as much as the law is all right but needs honest and strict enforcement.

No. 4. Resolved that in connection with our Sub. Divisions we try to start our meetings at a fixed hour and that each deputy bring the matter to his respective Division in a careful method that this question will then receive due consideration by the members.
