Chinese Retreat

A Chinese communique said Chinese regulars who had been defending Chaoyang, second city in size in Jehol Province, against a combined Japanese and Manchukuo attack, had withdrawn and thrown up a line of defence 10 miles to the west.

City Abandoned

Kailu, northeastern gateway to the province, also was abandoned, the announcement said, adding that the reason was the place was untenable because of the flat terrain surrounding it.

500 Killed

Chinese casualties to date were reported to number 500. Cold weather prevailed over most of the territory. That was said to be the worst enemy encountered by the cavalry of General Mogi which went into action in the face of sub-zero winds which drove before it desert sands mixed with snow.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Abbies Win Round

"Blood and Steel Corps"

A mixed force of regulars of Marshal Chang Hsiao-Liang, north China military commander, and volunteers going under the name of the "blood and steel corps" entrenched themselves on a hilly pass and stood off the vanguard of Hattori's forces all day long. Bombing planes from Chinchow were rushed to assist in routing the defenders.

The Japanese asserted furthermore that their gains thus far had not been costly, the only casualties mentioned being forty Japanese wounded in an engagement east of Chaoyang Saturday.

New 1000

PEIPING, Feb. 27—(Monday)—(A.P.)—Chinese casualties in the fighting in Jehol Province were officially estimated today at 1,000. The Japanese casualties were said to be unknown but it was stated the invaders had lost 600 in killed and wounded near Paishihstumen, near Lingyuan, alone.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6—(By The Canadian Press)—A courageous little band of Canadian girl athletes were homeward bound tonight after making a gallant stand in the United States women's indoor track and field championships in Madison Square Garden Saturday afternoon.

The girls, representing the Lakeside Athletic Club, of Toronto, smilingly concealed their suffering after an automobile accident 100 miles outside New York while en route here, and stepped onto the Garden track to snare second place in the 400-metre final and second and third places in the 50-metre final.

A wholesale dethroning of champions and the breaking of two world records featured the meet. The two new records were established by Dorothy Lyford of Boston, in the standing broad jump, and Na Gindele of Chicago, in the basketball throw.

Fascist Press Makes Charges

ROME, Feb. 26—(A.P.)—A charge that France and the Little Entente are undermining Geneva peace efforts had been made today by Il Giornale Ditalia as the latest broadside from the Fascist press in denunciation of what the newspaper termed dangerous military preparations.

The paper published Saturday what is said were secret clauses of a recent pact negotiated by the nations of the "Little Entente, indicating the signatories intend to occupy Hungary in case of aggression from other nations, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania comprise the Little Entente.

"Profound insincerity still governs the relations of European nations," Il Giornale said, adding that Italy feels it to be her duty to make disclosures as a great power sharing responsibility for order and progress on the continent.

The Paper reproduced alleged paragraphs from the Little Entente agreement, describing them as excerpts from previous agreements which were incorporated in the general pact recently evolved at Geneva.

One of these excerpts, described as from a 1929 treaty between Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia, was quoted thus: "In case Czechoslovakia is attacked by a nation other than Hungary, each party agrees to mobilize six divisions of infantry and one brigade of cavalry to defend the boundaries touching Hungary."
