CLAMORING FOR WAR.

LONDON, August 22.—The Balkan situation is still threatening. The Albanian difficulty apparently has been settled, but the Bulgarian populace is clamoring for war, and efforts to procure a settlement with Montenegro have failed, according to reports current in European capitals, and it is believed at Constantinople that formal peace negotiations are about to be commenced at Paris between Italy and Turkey.

The peace negotiations, however, are likely to be checked by a new crisis arising from the collapse of the Turkish coalition cabinet.

Hilmi Pasha, the Minister of Justice, who favored a policy of conciliating the Young Turks, has resigned, and the difficulty of reconstructing the ministry is so great that it is not unlikely that Kiamil Pasha, who strongly opposes the committee of union and progress, may find himself compelled to present the resignation of the whole Cabinet.

Meanwhile, according to a Turkish report, not yet confirmed, from Cetinje the Montenegrin Cabinet has fallen.

SALONIKI, August 22.—Turkish troops from Ipek have relieved Berana a district of Albania close to the Montenegrin frontier, which was besieged by Montenegrins and Malsor tribesmen.

Fighting on the Montenegrin frontier continues.

LONDON, August 22.—The Turkish Ambassador in London will engage in the peace negotiations at Paris, according to the correspondent at Constantinople of the Daily Chronicle, who adds that hopes for a speedy conclusion of peace with Italy are increasing at the Turkish capital.

PHILIPPOPOLIS, Bulgaria, August 22.—Speeches urging war against Turkey in order to liberate Macedonia were greeted with enthusiasm at one of the biggest political meetings ever held here yesterday. After the meeting the crowd, carrying black banners, marched to the military club where they cheered the officers who appeared on the balcony.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 22.—Halim Bey, a member of the Turkish Senate, was appointed Minister of Justice today in succession to Hilmi Pasha, who resigned.

BOARD OF TRADE CONCLUDES SESSIONS.

TRURO, Aug. 22.—The Maritime Board of Trade concluded its two days' session this afternoon. The board decided to meet next year in Newcastle.

The following officers were elected: President, Matthew Lodge, Moncton; first vice-president, E. T. Higgs, Charlottetown; second vice-president, H. J. Logan, Amherst; secretary, Thomas Williams, Moncton.

The following resolution by E. A. McCurdy, Newcastle, and seconded by Capt Reid, of Summerside, was passed:

"Resolved, That the executive of the Maritime Board of Trade be requested to call on the railway commission, when in Ottawa, and obtain an assurance from them that steps will be taken forthwith to compel the railway to charge in future the same passenger rates from the west to the east as from the east to the west in order that all the provinces of the dominion be placed on equal footing."

This afternoon the visiting delegates were given an extended motor drive through the surrounding country.

At yesterday's session it was decided to ask the government to complete the National Transcontinental Railway from Moncton to the Atlantic seaboard, the line to take a different route from that of the I. C. R. and the government will also be asked to double track the I. C. R. from Moncton to Halifax.

MASSACRE OF CHRISTIANS.

(Canadian Press.) SALONIKI, European Turkey, Aug. 24.—The Turkish commander D. Javik Pasha with a force of troops today left Petch town in the valley of Kosovo and was hurrying to the relief of the Berana Albanian district on Montenegrin border where, for several days a massacre of Christians by the Mahomedans has been in progress.

Montenegrins who invaded the territory to stop butchery and who were driven back across the frontier by the Turks, is reported to have again visited the districts and is said to be fortifying the Turkish garrison and beat there.
