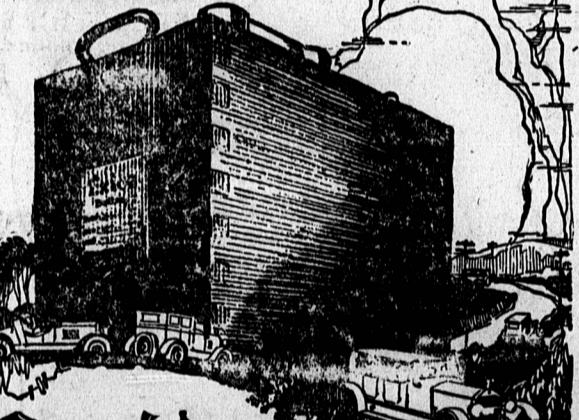

Potato Crop In N. B. Is Smaller

Less By 4,000,000 Bushels Than Last Year—Season Was Rainy

FREDERICTON, N.B., October 16.—A summary of conditions on October 16th issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture says in part:

The season of 1922 has been favorable to those crops which thrive with copious rain: Hay, grass pastures, grain and root crops made rapid and vigorous growth: The acre yield is estimated at one and one half tons on 715,000 acres. Factory dairy prices were lower than last year, though the increased output will bring to the patrons of creameries and cheese factories close to \$1,000,000. Heavy rains which occurred just before harvesting began caused the grain to lodge, making harvesting particularly trying.

The potato crop is less than last year by 4,000,000 bushels. The acreage (74,000 acres) is the same, the shrinkage being due to a lower acre yield. In the commercial districts only slight traces of rotting occurred. In other countries, Sunbury, King's, Kent and Westmorland, considerable rotting is reported on lowlying grounds. The yield per acre or that part of the total crop which was grown specially for such purposes, which was inspected by officers of the Dominion division of botany and passed the requirements for certification for export, will approximate 300 bushels per acre on 1,000 acres graded Extra No. 1.

The acreage of various crops and a provisional estimate of the total yield is as follows:

The numbers of the various classes of livestock, with the exception of hogs, remain about the same as last year. An increase in the valuation per head of cattle and sheep is, however, noteworthy.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. FRANCIS HOGAN

Many friends throughout the city will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Francis Hogan, which occurred at the City Hospital yesterday morning. The late Mrs. Hogan was a daughter of the late Patrick Flynn, and is the second death in the family within a year.

The late Mrs. Hogan leaves to mourn besides her sorrowing husband one infant son and two brothers, Thomas of the C. N. R., and John, both of this city, to all of whom the Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy.

THE LATE HUGH LIVINGSTONE

The death took place at West Somerville, Mass., on October 3rd of Hugh Livingstone, under very sad circumstances.

While working on a building the staging gave way, and falling some 30 feet, he sustained such serious injuries that after eight days of suffering he passed peacefully away at St. Elizabeth Hospital, Brighton.

He was the youngest son of the late Allan Livingstone of Nine Mile Creek and left here when quite young for Boston where he lived and died, visiting his native home some twenty years ago.

He was in the prime of life, being only in his 53rd year. He leaves to mourn a wife, nee Isabel White and two sons, Elmo and Alton, also one daughter, Edna, now Mrs. Holmes, all living in West Somerville, also four brothers, Allan at Nine Mile Creek, John in Cambridge, Mass., and David and Alexander in Charlottetown, besides a host of relatives and friends.

His remains were interred in Woodlawn cemetery Malden; services being held in the church which he attended, Rev. Mr. Heath officiating. Two solos, "There's a Beautiful Home on High," and "Abide With Me," were beautifully sung by Miss Dorothy M. Holmes, also a poem was read composed by the deceased entitled "At Mother's Knee."

Mr. Livingstone's exemplary character while living was attested to by the many floral tributes, and the large concourse of people who followed the remains to the grave. He was conscious until a few hours before his death, his conversation always being on things eternal and he died fully trusting in the merits of his Redeemer.
