**More Assistants for Cabinet Heads**

OTTAWA, April 18.—(C.P.)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King said in the Commons tonight that the House would "change considerably" after the next general election and it was well to have younger men "learning from the inside" as Parliamentary assistants to present ministers.

"While many of us who have had to do with this very strenuous period of Parliamentary activity will be prepared to serve as long as there is a possibility of service and as long as the public wish us to serve and will be ready to do our part at all times, yet it would be most unfortunate for this country if younger men were not learning from the inside, and from their intimate association with the ministers, something of the problems which will have to be dealt with in this Parliament in the years to come," said Mr. King.

The Prime Minister said that Gordon Clouston, Progressive Conservative Finance leader, had announced that he would be taking on additional ministerial duties in addition to the present cabinet of 20 and seven Parliamentary assistants.

Mr. King said public life was becoming more difficult and would become increasingly difficult as the years went by. He hoped the

**Winning Writers Named In Annual Literary Contest**

OTTAWA, April 17.—(CP)—Thomas H. Raddall, English-born Maritimer, is the winner of the Governor-General's 1943 Literary Award for Fiction. It was announced tonight by Charles Clay, national secretary of the Canadian Authors' Association.

Mr. Raddall, who lives at Liverpool, N.S., gained recognition for his "The Pied Piper of Dipper Creek," an anthology of the author's various dealings with the English background of Nova Scotia.

A.J.M. Smith, Montreal-born professor of English at Michigan State University, Ypsilanti, Mich., won the poetry division for his "News of the Phoenix."

The award in the creative non-fiction division went to John D. Robins, professor of English at Victoria College, University of Toronto, for his "The Incomplete Angles."

In academic non-fiction Dr. E.K. Brown, president of the University of Toronto, and chairman of the department, Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., won the award with his "On Canadian Poetry."

Mr. Raddall, winner of the fiction award, is the son of a British Army officer who transferred to the Canadian Army in 1913 and moved to Halifax. His father was killed in the First Great War in 1918 at which time young Raddall left Halifax Academy at the age of 15 to join the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and served on several front-line posts in the Yukon. After four years of this roving life he returned to Halifax, took an accounting course and obtained a job with a small pulp mill in Queens County.

It was then he began to experiment with short stories, on Nova Scotia country life. His first "break" came in 1933 when George Blackwood of Blackwood's Magazine, an

English publication, began to publish a series of Raddall's tales. The stories brought a warm note of praise from the late John Buchan who later became Lord Tweedsmuir and Canada's governor-general.

Incidentally the awards were begun during Lord Tweedsmuir's tenure of office and were continued by the Earl of Atholby. The awards are silver medals.

Winner of the poetry award, Mr. Smith is a graduate of McGill University and the University of Edinburgh. He was one of the founders and editors of the literary fortnightly Review and early attracted attention for his poems contributed to The Canadian Forum, The Nation, The Dial and the Advertiser (London). In 1943 he was awarded the Harriet Monroe Memorial Prize for a group of poems in the Canadian issue of Poetry. A critic as well as a poet, he has written on modern poetry and Canadian literature in various publications.

Dr. Robins, author of the "complete Angles" was born in Ontario. He was taken to school at the age of six and mixed work with education and finally graduated from the University of Toronto. He was taken to the staff of Victoria College to teach German, switched in 1925 to English and has been there ever since.

An enthusiastic fisherman, Dr. Robins says he had been "dogged most of my fishing life by persistent bad luck." He came up through the sunfish and catfish stages to black bass and then to trout. He has a light rod, and finally to harpoon while.

Dr. E.K. Brown, winner of the academic non-fiction award, was born in Toronto and was government scholar when he graduated from the University of Toronto. He later studied at the University of Minnesota, University of Chicago and Cornell.

Academic Non-Fiction: Dr. Sidney Smith, president of the University of Manitoba; A. L. Phelps, department of English professor, Dalhousie College, Winnipeg; David C. Brown, department of philosophy professor, United College, Winnipeg.

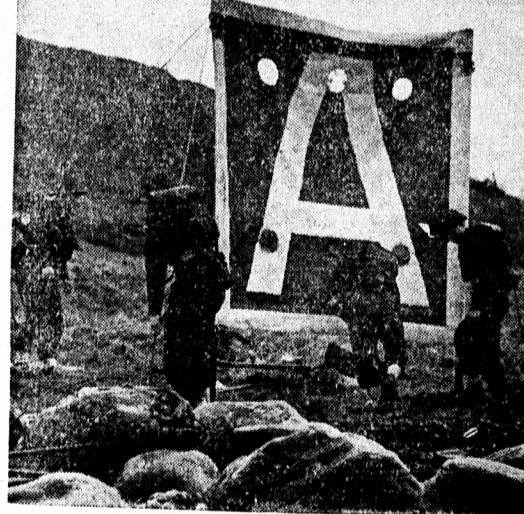

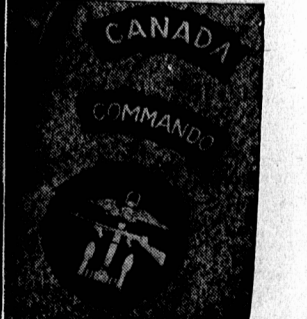
