EATING WITH BRITISH ROYALTIES

These recipes are taken from the old household "Scrap Book" started by Queen Victoria in 1831. (Copied in Queen Victoria's handwriting.)

"Copied"—Victoria—1836.

Mix together the whites of 8 eggs, a quart of thick fresh cream, and half pint of sack. Sweeten with a double refined sugar to taste, and perfume with musk or ambergris, orange or rose flowers, drying the latter if they be dried leaves in a muslin cloth. Lay on the froth as high as possible in small and pretty glasses.

To a pint of new milk add a few coriander seeds, washed, a bit of lemon peel, a laurel leaf, a stick
