Therefore we feel proud to be able to send one from our midst who is fired with such commendable patriotism. It is the sincere wish of all your friends that God will shield you from harm and we all will pray for the protection of heaven on your movements. In conclusion we all join in presenting you with our best wishes and this gift of gold which but faintly testifies to the affection in which we hold you. We pray that Providence will return you safely to us when the cruel war shall be successfully terminated.

The Ontario men went forward first of all, and are now experiencing active service conditions, eating bully beef and hard tack, and each man sleeping under one blanket.

Captain Coghill, of Stratford is in the Canadian hospital at Letouquet, suffering from pleurisy. The Patricia's were recent in an important engagement. Their casualties now total thirty killed and fifty wounded.

FROM SALISBURY

This letter has been received from Mr. Peter A. Hughes by his mother, Mrs. Catherine Hughes, Corran Ban Bridge, P. E. I., and will be of much to his many friends throughout the Island.

My dear mother—I suppose by this time you have found out where I am, as Frank Kelly told me he had written to you the time; one peculiar feature I notice is so many of the old men who are crippled, likely old soldiers who have been maimed in different campaigns. The work is all being done by old men, boys and girls are either at the front or in training. England is really an armed camp. In every hamlet and town are mustered men training hard for the front. I have met and talked with a great number of wounded from the front. The tales they tell of German atrocities are terrible and would make a person's blood boil. I also have seen a great number of the Belgian refugees. You would feel sorry for them. Some of the children have their hands cut off and the way the nuns have been treated is terrible. One man who seemed truthful told me he saw the body of a woman nailed to a tree. Germany is beginning to realize that she will be beaten and badly beaten she will be. Do not worry about me. That was the reason I did not write you but as we go to France in February I thought it better to write you for me. If anything should befall me you will be notified by the War Office, but I have a hunch I will come safely out of it. I have not seen the P. E. I. lot yet as they are some twenty miles away. Frank Kelly and I will go some day soon to see them. Frank is fine. As I write news has come that the Princess Patricia's regiment from Canada who are at the front, were carried away by excitement and refused to obey orders, were badly cut up. They counted themselves the crack regiment. Well there is a great deal of the battalions there is some epidemic of cerebral spinal meningitis, a great number having died. When we come back from Berlin we shall have a couple of weeks freedom and if I come through safely, I intend to go to Ireland. Some time send me the name of the part of Corbro that grandpater came from.

One heath is very few in comparison with the great numbers engaged. What we are a little scared of here is that the United States might chip in on the wrong side. If so Canada would be made the battleground between the Japanese and Americans. It looks by the number of powers in this, that this is the great predicted war. If so it is as well to be in it willingly as unwillingly. I am glad I joined and look forward to see you in the not too distant future when we return to Canada. Terrific fighting in the spring will mark the beginning of the end and by next autumn Germany should be conquered. We will not reach the firing line until about April so write to the address I shall give you and even if I am in France the letter will be forwarded to me. There are a great number of P. E. I's in this regiment. A McLellan from Kensington, Rummigan from Kinkora, etc. I shall send you some snapshots taken in camp. Tell the rest to write as it is nice to receive letters here. Well, dear mother, I must close. I shall write every few days to let you know how I am getting along. My best love to everyone.

BUCKINGHAM PALACE IS PROTECTED FROM POSSIBLE ZEP ATTACKS.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The private apartments of the Royal family in Buckingham Palace are being protected against possible German air raids. Ever since the Zeppelin raid of a few weeks ago, when bombs were dropped near Sandringham, one of the Royal residences, there have been reports in circulation that protective measures would be adopted for at least part of Buckingham Palace. Much attention was attracted today when workmen began to spread heavy wire netting over that part of the palace occupied as residential quarters by the royal family. This netting was placed on a heavy framework trestle which stands six feet or more from the roof proper. Among other places in London protected by a similar screen are the houses of the Duchess of Marlboro, one of the Rothschilds and some of the public institutions.

PASSENGER FOR CANADA COMMITTED SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The new Anchor Liner Tuscania arrived here today on her maiden voyage from Glasgow and Liverpool. She was built at Glasgow and is of 14,000 tons gross register. She brought 883 passengers and more than 3,000 sacks of mail. Thomas Williams, a native of Wales, on his way to Canada, jumped overboard during the voyage and was lost.
