This costume is worn with a brown and bisque velvet and ribbon hat and a coat of brown caracul trimmed with fox fur.

Just the right jewellery adds radiance to a woman's looks, and just the wrong jewellery can dull both her complexion and her costume. For example, you need a brilliant complexion to dominate the gray twinkle of the crystal ornaments now so popular. You need a nice skin to wear pearls. If you are very pale, you will look your best with some of the red jewellery, and with some other shades if you won't. If you have gray hair and a good skin, the turquoise was made for you. If you happen to be just the right type of blonde, choose pink coral and plenty of it. Sapphires will enhance the blue of your eyes, and emeralds will turn certain hazel eyes to a glorious luminous green.

### CHILDREN SHOULD KNOW HISTORIC EVENTS OF WAR

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 23.—Urging that the children of Canada be given a full understanding of the part played by their country in the Great War a series of resolutions will come up for consideration by the third dominion convention of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League to be held here from Nov. 25 to 28.

There has been a great awakening of interest among ex-service men in the historical records of the Great War and the part of Canada and the Empire in particular in its presentation in school books and through other channels. Branches of the Canadian Legion which have been discussing this question have in resolutions sent on to the convention expressed the view that coming generations should be given an opportunity to attain a complete knowledge of the Great War its causes, progress and outcome and the contribution of their own nation in the successful prosecution of the conflict.

As a part of an education program, the Legion will have before it at the convention suggestions for the use of every channel of communication, the written and spoken word, pictures, radio and other means, both by way of instruction to Canadians generally and to offset unreliable statements which emanate from irresponsible sources in other countries.

Other proposals contained in resolutions to be presented to the convention will urge the immediate preparation and presentation for permanent display of Canada's priceless collection of war photographs, films and other works of art.

### Health Services of Canadian Medical Association

#### SHOULD I HAVE AN X-RAY?

It is quite evident that many persons have the idea that in almost every condition from which the human body suffers, an X-Ray examination is required to enable the doctor to understand the case. It is also apparent that there exists a popular idea that, by means of the X-Ray, the physician can see all parts of the inside of the body and study their action just as clearly and simply as he views the skin with his eyes.

The majority of those who enter a doctor's office, whether because they are ill or because they want to keep well, can be examined thoroughly and satisfactorily by the doctor's using such instruments as are found in any properly equipped office and making such tests as can be made, with his ordinary equipment, by any qualified physician.

When the ordinary procedures are inadequate for a particular case, and when the doctor believes that certain special examinations or tests will be of assistance, he will not hesitate to so inform his patient. The public should understand that, in any case, a diagnosis of disease is not made by special tests, X-Ray, or other examinations. What these do is to supply additional information which the doctor considers, together with the other facts which he has gathered from his questioning of the patient and the results of the examination which he himself has made. Physicians do not make a diagnosis on one symptom or one test or on what is shown by an X-Ray, but upon the accumulation of all the findings.

The X-Ray is, in many conditions, a most valuable aid to the physician. It has increased its field of usefulness, but it still has certain limitations, and its use and the interpretation of its findings are not as simple as is commonly thought. It seems necessary to refer to this because it is apparent that some persons rather feel they have been cheated when their physician does not order them to have an X-Ray.

Physicians know when special tests and examinations are needed, and they will use them when they judge them to be necessary.

### Combined Color In Curtains

An easy way of achieving a modernistic effect in curtaining is to use a light shade of material as glass curtains and drape a darker shade of the same material over it, catching it back about two-thirds of the way down and using only one to a window.

Another simple way is to take strips of chiffon or georgette in three shades of any luscious color and hang them vertically or horizontally.

#### BEAUTY PROGRAM FOR BUSY WOMEN

Many a woman in her later 30s looks into her mirror and is quite dismayed at the reflection which greets her there. She may be startled to discover that time is leaving its marks on her face and that youth and beauty seem to have departed before she even realized it. For a few days or possibly weeks she may try desperately to erase the little lines left by the years and to freshen the sallow complexion. But when the results are not immediate perhaps she becomes weary in well doing and settles down to accept the fact.

"Well, I am getting old, and what's the use of all this fussing? Beauty belongs to youth, anyway," she may say.

But deep down in the heart of every woman this admission hurts, and fortunately, it isn't true. Beauty belongs to youth, of course, but not to youth alone. For there is a beauty of maturity which is deeper and richer than the fleeting beauty of younger years. When the years have had the opportunity of leaving their stamp of character on the face and when the eyes have become deep pools of thought, beauty means so much more than it possibly could in earlier years. She who has kept herself mentally lovely now has sweetness in her expression and facial lines which point upward instead of downward, as they are sure to do if one has allowed oneself a pessimistic viewpoint of life.

#### REGULARITY ESSENTIAL

However, though maturity has a deeper beauty of its own, it is quite true that while youth may be a bit lax in her beauty regime, this will never do for the woman who has reached her 30s. A spasmodic attendance at the beauty shop for massages and treatments will never do for her now. She must keep everlastingly vigilant to retain that beauty to which every woman is entitled and for which every woman longs.

"That's the trouble," complains many a woman, "it takes too much time." But, after all, it isn't so much time, but rather regularity and system. All the time needed is a few minutes each and every day, not two or three hours on one day and then neglect for the rest of the week. It is not possible to many women to spend hours a day on a beauty program, nor should it be necessary. But surely every woman would be willing to devote fifteen to twenty minutes each day for the sake of keeping beautiful.

Physical poise, mental alertness, suppleness and grace are the basis of a youthful and beautiful appearance. Any woman can acquire and keep these qualities if she will give a few minutes daily to exercise, both mental and physical. Health, of course, is essential, and also a well-balanced mind.

#### DAILY BEAUTY PROGRAM

First of all, it is very necessary that one should exercise each day, for in flexibility of muscles and mind lies the secret of keeping fit. But aside from the daily exercise which is also a necessary health measure every woman whose years number more than thirty should spend fifteen to twenty minutes on some specific beauty regime.

For the busy woman a definite plan for this program will undoubtedly be welcome. Let Monday's fifteen minutes be spent on the complexion: study the face carefully and give it its weekly massage and beauty pack. See if the skin is dry or oily, and if troubled with blackheads, pimples or enlarged pores treat them on Monday

Tuesday may be hair day. Give the scalp fifteen minutes of thorough, vigorous massage to stimulate the circulation. Every other week shampoo the hair with a pure, mild liquid shampoo. If possible, dry it in the sunlight; at last, give it an air bath and, if necessary, apply a hair tonic or salve. Unfortunately most people keep their scalp pores in a half-starved, suffocated condition, when in most cases such simple measures as fresh air, sunshine and vigorous daily massage and brushing will keep the hair growing with life and health.

Wednesday's fifteen minutes may be devoted to beautifying the neck and throat. If a double chin and flabbiness threaten to come, give special treatment with astringent compresses. For a thin or discolored neck, massage with a thin cream or skin food and use a bleachin pack. Wrinkled, flabby necks also need massage and exercise, and though the color of the neck is naturally somewhat darker than the face, guard against its becoming too pronounced by using a bleaching pack each Wednesday.

Thursday is eye day. Eye wrinkles are perhaps the commonest kind and

appear earliest, so on this day massage gently around the eyes and across the path of the wrinkles, using a tissue cream or special oil for this purpose. Make it a point to rest your eyes as much as possible on Thursday and bathe them with a weak solution of boric acid.

On Friday let the beauty program include attention to arms, hands, nails and elbows. Manicure the fingernails well once a week, but make Friday their special day. To keep the hands smooth and lovely, massage them generously with an almond cream, an astringent, dry, caloused elbows are very unsightly, give them a thorough massage on Friday.

Friday is an important day in a woman's beauty program, for it is then she should study her face dispassionately to see where wrinkles are forming and try to discover what expression may be causing them. Try on different expressions, and when you have found the most becoming one, why not decide to wear it? Then, to improve the wrinkled and sagging tissues, a good skin tonic and tissue cream should be applied.

#### THE BEAUTY BATH

As eternal vigilance is the price the woman past 30 must pay to retain her beauty, not even Sunday must she allow herself laxity in her beauty regime. While she should take a cold shower or tepid sponge bath every morning and a warm cleansing bath every night, she should let Sunday be the day for taking a special perfumed bath to keep the skin soft and white. There are many bath powders and bath salts on the market, but for those who wish to make their own the following will be helpful: One dram

### Right Shoes For Formal Wear

#### ALL-GOLD AND ALL-SILVER OUT OF FASHION—TRIMMINGS GOOD

For all the variety there is in smart evening footwear, it is possible to select so that one smart pair fits more than one frock. Perfect ensembling, however, is so important that if one expects to have but a limited evening wardrobe it would be well to consider the gowns and the shoes simultaneously, letting the colors and fabrics in the dresses be such that they can be complemented without great expense.

The opera pump has a sure place in evening fashion and in moire with delicate heel and slightly pointed toe is choice. It dyes beautifully—to match or contrast, according to your plan.

Open-shank slippers, and by that is meant those that are sometimes designated as sandals—very much out of out and having T—or centre buckle single straps—are equally fashion right.

Moire, satin and crepe de chine slippers piped or decorated with strips of silver or gold kid (sometimes silver and gold in combination) perhaps outdo all others in number. When carefully selected in the matter of color these harmonize well with several frocks.

To be worn with the black frock are all black moire sandals very much out of out and with slender T straps and very high heels; also slippers combining back section of plain black, vamp of black and silver brocade, and strap of silver kid.

Lovely for the off-white evening frock are slippers of matching moire decorated as simply as possible with a combination of satin, moire and crepe; slippers of satin, moire or crepe dyed in vivid color contrast, and slippers of gold lame.

To sum up, then, opera pumps, strap slippers made delicate-looking with fine pipings, etc., and sandal-type slippers are good fashion for evening. All-gold and all-silver are out of fashion, but gold and silver trimmings are excellent. Evening slippers may match or contrast. And moire is one of the newest, most practical and attractive evening slipper materials.

lobe of each ear is permitted to show and long earrings may be used to give slenderness to the face. Bring the ends around to the back and tuck them in with a small comb or ornament.

Another chic coiffure for the girl who is letting her hair grow is arranged with a short center part. Across the ends of the part make another part running from ear to ear. This results in a narrow front section of hair and a larger back section. The back hair may be brushed smooth or waved from side to side. A very slight wave is put into the front hair and the ends are curled upward and pushed behind the ears and pinned securely. A little wisp of hair is curled up in front of the ear.

A small, flat curl or two may be arranged on the forehead on each side of the centre part. The back hair is tied and divided into two parts which are twisted into a flat coil of fan-shaped bun across the nape of the neck and fastened securely.

The simple, straight-back, sleek coiffure with no part is also very smart this season, but there are very few women who find it flattering. To look well in such a style one's face must be delicately molded. The skin must be flawless and lineless, the features finely chiseled and the head well formed. The neck and shoulders must also be ideally modeled, neither too fleshy nor too thin. Poise and a certain distinction of carriage are very important to the woman who wishes to wear her hair straight back and brushed sleek and close to the head without the softening, feminizing effect of waves, fluffiness and curls. This type of coiffure is brushed straight back and the hair coiled artistically on the nape of the neck. It is usually suitable for the tall brunette with jet black, glossy hair, or for the tall, golden blond type. Earrings are worn to match the color scheme of the dress, hair and eyes.

#### Paris Suffering From Overcrowding

PARIS, France, Nov. 26.—(By Josephine Hambleton, Staff Correspondent, the Canadian Press)—Paris is in a terrific jam. Above-ground and below-ground, she is at rush hours in a maze. And nobody yet has found an effective way out. One suggestion is that the City of Light shall become a City of Air.

In the meantime, paragraphists scoff and cartoonists ridicule. One cartoonist puts the thing neatly; he pictures Paris, not as a dominant dame of martial airs, but as a woman, very feeble, very ill. Her glorious crown is askew. A sympathetic doctor stands by her side. He feels her pulse.

He shakes his head, sorrowfully. "Alas, Madame," is the verdict, "circulation very bad, very bad indeed." One witty commentator proposes that pedestrians should be exiled to the perpetual twilight of an underground city. Another satirically suggested that a runway for autos should be cut under all buildings and Paris stand on cement columns. A third that the Seine, haunt of the flaneur, artist and the book-lover should be covered over by a landing ground for aeroplanes. M. Chlappe, prefect of police, has three remedies.

- 1.—The construction of great underground tunnels along the Rue de Rivoli and the boulevards leading to the Place de Etoile.
- 2.—Complete abolition of street cars.
- 3.—A bylaw to forbid parking on a large number of thoroughfares. The cost of these transformations would run around two million dollars a mile.

But the most advanced measure of all lies in a proposal which would make Paris a leading air-traffic city of the world. As preliminary to this end, it is suggested that suburban development should be more severely controlled. Paris would then be connected by air with more flourishing garden cities built on distant hills.

The Canadian or American who arrives from Cherbourg at St. Lazare sees perhaps the early evening traffic and wonders how his taxi driver extricate itself from the mass. But he has little idea of the world of traffic that lies below, the Metro and the Nord Sud, the underground systems are the Italian's most popular and swift mode of travel. They are cheaper than the New York Subway; the New Yorker is fond of boasting that his subway is the cheapest in the world.

In the last 12 months the Mayor of London has attended no 400 banquets, at times having to appear at two in the same evening.
