OWING to the snow storm the morning train did not leave Summerside until 12 o'clock noon reaching the city at 3.45. The train for Tignish left Charlottetown at 12.10 and arrived late last night. Owing to continuation of storm, the train from Tignish did not leave until 1 p. m. and arrived in Charlottetown at 1 o'clock this morning. The train on the Cape Traverse branch left Cape Traverse at 2.45 and its whistle could be heard plainly at Emerald early in the evening as it worked its way through the snow.

THE monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment to be 1290; the percentage of attendance 88; the number of cases of tardiness 254; truants 4; visits to parents 247; notices 54; corporal punishment 15; below average in grading 75; requesting to leave school before the hour of closing 125. Miss Harris, Miss Scott and Miss Wadman had no cases of tardiness for the month. In Prince St School the highest percentage of attendance was made in Miss Scott's department 91. In Queen Square School Mr. Landrigan's and Mr. Smith's 96. In West Kent, Mr. Bowness 95. Tenders for the construction of new boiler for Prince St School were considered and the contract awarded to Bruce Stewart & Co., they being the lowest tenderers. The following resolution was unanimously agreed to: "That a committee of three members be appointed to confer with the Chief of the Fire Department and with the Principals of the Schools and to enquire into the best means to be adopted to prevent any disaster, in case of a fire occurring in any of the school buildings. The committee to report at next meeting, and to obtain estimates of cost of plan proposed" and the following compose the Committee: Mr. McLeod, Mr. Handrahan and Dr. Jenkins. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.
