## SPORTING NEWS FAST HOCKEY AT SUMMERSIDE

The Summerside rink was crowded on Friday evening last for the sixth game of the P. E. Island Hockey League between the Crystals and the Connaughts, the former winning by the score of 5-2.

How did they do it? Well, the Crystals played the best game. The Conns. also played an excellent game but were unused to the rink, the promenade being where they lacked, the rebounding of the puck being entirely different.

It was a fast game throughout, filled with both individual and combination runs by both sides which were exceedingly good exhibitions of play. Time and again the Crystals' forward line was right on the job and in playing the game of his life showed he was second to none on P. E. Island as a goal-keeper. It was a pretty game to watch, remarkably clean with the exception of some rough work by McQuarrie for which he spent in all eight minutes on the promenade.

It was 8:30 o'clock when the game started and after 9 minutes of play from a mix-up Grady shot from the side and scored a lucky one. The Conns' goal-keeper was not expecting it from such a distance. The first of a series of delays then occurred. It might be mentioned here that delays totalling over 15 minutes occurred in the first half. Some good runs were then made by McQuarrie.

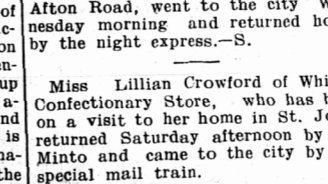
