A VISIT TO A LOBSTER CANNERY AT NORTH LAKE, P. E. I.

While on a visit to P. E. I. last summer the writer had the privilege of inspecting one of the P. E. I. lobster factories. This particular one is situated at North Lake, not far from East Point. The factory is owned by Matthew & McLean, of Souris, and is Superintended by F. D. Bennett with Edward Peters as Assistant. There are 50 employees, 30 males and 20 female, all of whom seem to be experts at their work. The most modern methods are used and the place is scrupulously clean.

Wonderful improvements have been made during the past fifty years in the way of boiling the lobsters in huge crates lowered into the boilers, the cracking of the claws and the usage of almost the entire lobster. Even the small legs are put between rollers and the meat squeezed from them, even the interior of the body, the red part and the green together with the fine juicy meat of the legs are all made into a paste with seasoning of different kinds and sold as rare bits, etc., and used on sandwiches at high class banquets. When we were boys all of the body was thrown away.

The packing room was also interesting and here the different parts of the lobster came into this department and women dressed in white packed the meat into half and quarter pound cans. The interior of the cans were japanned and also lined with oil skin paper and each can carefully weighed. They are then moved on to the sealer who with a movement of his foot and the turn of a crank seals 30 a minute. He operates a patent sealer and the old method of soldering the cans is no more. The cans are then wheeled into a retort and cooked for 35 minutes; thus the meat is thoroughly cooked. The catch this spring was considered good in this particular cannery. During the month of May the catch amounted to 170,918 lbs., the number of cans packed was 800 as a similar large pack was expected before the season closed. The lobster industry is surely profitable to the Islanders.

Early in Spring is the best time to transplant most kinds of trees and shrubs, evergreens included. Evergreens may be transplanted in summer but greater precautions must be taken to do it successfully.

The western potato flea is dull bronze in colour, one-twelfth of an inch long, and covered with fine short hairs. Its food plants are the potato and tomato.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 4.—(C. P.)—Bridges of the future will excel anything yet known in beauty and size, single length and dull bridge paints of forbidding battle-ship grey will give way to gay, bright colors, Dr. D. B. Steinman, New York consulting engineer, predicted in an address here. "New metals are being tried," he said. "Aluminum will be more extensively employed in future bridge erection. Bridge paints of dull black, and cold, forbidding battle-ship grey will give way to colors—soft bluish greens to match the landscape, relieved by bright stainless steel. New lines will express the functions of stress-bearing parts. The old cross-bracing principles are being eliminated."
