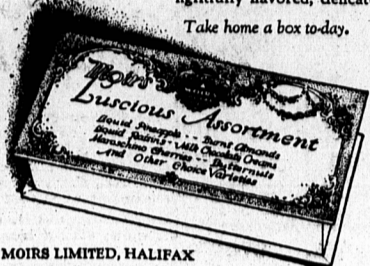

W. L. Cotton, Mrs. Bentley, Mr. J. J. McLeod and others. It was pointed out by Mr. McLeod that the Protestant Orphanage here is willing and anxious to place children in proper homes but this has been found a difficult task. Miss Robinson's remarks referred only to normal children. The good work done by the directors of the Orphanage was heartily endorsed and while the opinion was general expressed that the orphan child might have more home-like surroundings in a foster home, it was thought well to carry on at present with the existing institution until a more satisfactory system could be evolved.

Dr. Shearer took up in review the different classes of children which a comprehensive Child Welfare Law aims to protect. These embrace (1) dependent children who are being provided for now in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario by a Mothers' Allowance Law; (2) neglected children; (3) delinquent children; (4) physically defective children; (5) mentally defective children; (6) immigrant children; and (7) children of unmarried parents. He reviewed these different classes fully and explained that only in one province—Manitoba—has the attempt been made to put into force a law covering them all. He concluded by describing the machinery for the enforcement of the Manitoba law and voiced the hope that this province, if not the first, would surely not be the last to follow in the steps of Manitoba. In the evening a very enjoyable picture programme was put on the screen and very much enjoyed.

INCREASE IN PRICE OF PULPWOOD

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 20.—It is understood that an unusually large amount of pulpwood will be taken out in Northern Ontario and Eastern Quebec during the coming season. According to one settler of Cochrane, a higher price is likely to be paid during the coming winter. He stated that he had been offered a contract for all the wood he could cut at \$6.25 per cord, starting in as soon as he is ready. Last year the price was only \$4.50 a cord.

HARVEST RATES EXTENDED

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 20.—In an effort to overcome the shortage of harvesters in Western Canada the railways in co-operation with the Employment Service of Canada, have granted a ten days' extension of the special harvester excursion rates. It is announced here by Major L. E. Howard, eastern superintendent of the Employment Service of Canada. The extension is expected to bring immediate relief to the farmers in the West, particularly in Manitoba, where 4,000 more farm workers are required.
